

JEWIS IN TERROR FLY FROM LODZ

Rumor of an Approaching Massacre Causes an Exodus of 20,000.

TROOPS REFUSE TO FIRE

Officers of Regiment Report to their Commander That the Men Would Not Shoot at Defenseless People.

LODZ, Russian Poland, June 26.—Since the proclamation of martial law the situation has become quiet.

Scattered cases of rioting as a result of the insurrectionary spirit continue. One of these occurred today in the old Protestant cemetery, when a patrol was fired on from behind a wall.

A case of disaffection among the troops was reported today, when the officers of one regiment informed their commander that they would refuse to fire on defenseless people.

ALARMING REPORTS POUR IN

Russia Appears to Be a Boiling Cauldron of Discontent.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 27.—(3:35 P. M.)—These are gloomy days for the government of Russia. Every new dispatch accentuates the seriousness of the situation in Poland and the Caucasus.

Up to the present St. Petersburg and Moscow have not been affected, but if mobilization is to be attempted in the two capitals, as reported, a recrudescence of former tumults is likely to occur.

Another dangerous spot is Georgia (Russian Trans-Caucasia), the warlike inhabitants of which are deeply incensed over the affront offered their clergyman, 75 of whom, while meeting to discuss the question of church and state, were attacked by Cossacks, who dispersed the preachers with knouts.

The present trouble is all the more sudden and the more unexpected, coming on the heels of the good impression produced by the Emperor's reception of the Zemstvos and his promise to consider their grievances and to give the country a national assembly as rapidly as possible.

Dispatches from Poland continue to be meager and unsatisfactory. Apparently up to the present there has been no recurrence of disorder on the scale of the Lodz battle, but slight cases may precipitate collisions between troops and people in Lodz, Warsaw, Kalisz, and other Polish towns at any moment, with death lists as large as that of Friday at Lodz.

Fearing its effect on the industrial population, the St. Petersburg newspapers are forbidden even to reproduce the account of the Lodz disorders appearing in the Warsaw official Gazette, and though the fact that rioting has occurred is allowed to be chronicled, the censorship still bars details.

A dispatch from Berlin reports a new and alarming feature of the situation in the Caucasus in the desire of Persian Mohammedans to join their brethren across the border, which juncture would convert a racial strife into a "holy war," and kindle a fire which would devastate the Southern Caucasus and be extinguished only by streams of blood.

France Warns Belgian Minister. LONDON, June 27.—The Brussels correspondent of the Daily Mail says that France, fearing a sudden attack through Belgium, has officially warned the Belgian Minister at Paris of the necessity of rendering effective the fortifications of Antwerp and along the River Meuse.

Shortage in Cashier's Accounts. TERRE HAUTE, Ind., June 26.—The Vigo County National Bank issued the statement today that Cashier Coneman has resigned and that a shortage had been discovered in his accounts of about \$4,000. Coneman has turned over securities amounting to \$8,000.

People Run to Their Homes. KALISH, Russian Poland, June 26.—The population was thrown into a state of panic last night by a sudden volley of revolver shots in the center of the city and by red flag demonstrations.

Bomb Exploded at Cheshstohoff. CHESHSTOHOFF, Russian Poland, June 26.—A bomb was thrown into the police station here today. It wounded several policemen and broke all the windows for blocks around the station.

Arms Shipped to Caucasus. ROSTOFF-ON-DON, Russia, June 26.—The police have discovered that large quantities of arms and ammunition have been purchased here and shipped to the Caucasus.

Prices Weak on Bourse. ST. PETERSBURG, June 26.—Prices on the Bourse today continued weak on the news of the disturbances in Russian Poland, imperial \$4 losing 1/2 a point.

Troops to Suppress Disturbances. SARATOFF, Russia, June 26.—Troops have hurriedly been dispatched to three districts in this province to suppress agrarian disturbances.

Jewish Papers Are Suspected. WARSAW, June 26.—All the Jewish newspapers have been forbidden to issue any editions.
