

MISS ROOSEVELT PREFERS THE CITY

Withdraws Acceptance of San Francisco Matron's Hospitality.

WILL STAY AT THE PALACE

Complete Reason for This Action is Not Given—President's Daughter Enjoying Trip With All Father's Enthusiasm.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 3.—(Special)—For some unexplained reason, Miss Alice Roosevelt has withdrawn her acceptance of the hospitality of Mrs. V. H. Metcalf, wife of the Secretary of Commerce and Labor, during her stay in California on the way to the Philippines.

The supposition is that Miss Roosevelt found that it would be impossible for her to take part in the scheduled festivities unless she had apartments in San Francisco. Mrs. Dubois, the wife of the Senator, will act as her chaperon.
