A copy of the telegram which promises to cut a big figue in the coming fight is as follows: "Al Herford, Eurepa Athletic Club.-Boost Sullivan hard; challenge, etc.; chance here July; answer. -"WILLIE BRITT"

There is an interesting story back of the telegram falling .nto the possession of "Battling" Nelson. According to Nolan, Herford sent the telegram to a friend in New York. He waxed indignant over the scheme and forwarded the telegram to Battling Nelson in this city. Nolan claims that the Gans-Britt fight

was a "frame-up," and that the telegram to Herford shows what the public can ex-pect when Britt hooks up with Herford's protege, "Kid" Sullivan. Nolan says that Britt is not anxious for Nelson's game or he would live up to his agreement. 
