Railroad Commission Missouri Hands Tied by Court.

KANSAS CITY, July 12 -- Judge John F. Philips, in the United States District Court here today, granted the temporary injunction prayed for by the Missouri railroads, restraining the State Rallway and Warehouse Commissioners of Missouri and the Attorney-General of the state from enforcing the maximum freight rate law

enacted by the last Legislature. When the law went into effect on June 16, 18 railways in this state petitioned Judge Philips to restrain the state officials from enforcing the act, the railroads making the claim that the rates provided in the new law were prohibitive and would amount to the confiscation of their property. The suit also was directed against three Kansas City shippers, intended to cov er snippers as a class and to forestall any suits they might bring against the railroads. The court issued an order at that time preventing the en-forcement of the law until the matter of a temporary injunction would be argued. This order, which was

argued last week, was continued in today by Judge Phillips, who, after delivering an opinion, granted the railroad's petition for a temporary injunction.
