CAN'T ENFORCE RATE LAW. Missouri Railroad Commission's Hands Tied by Court.

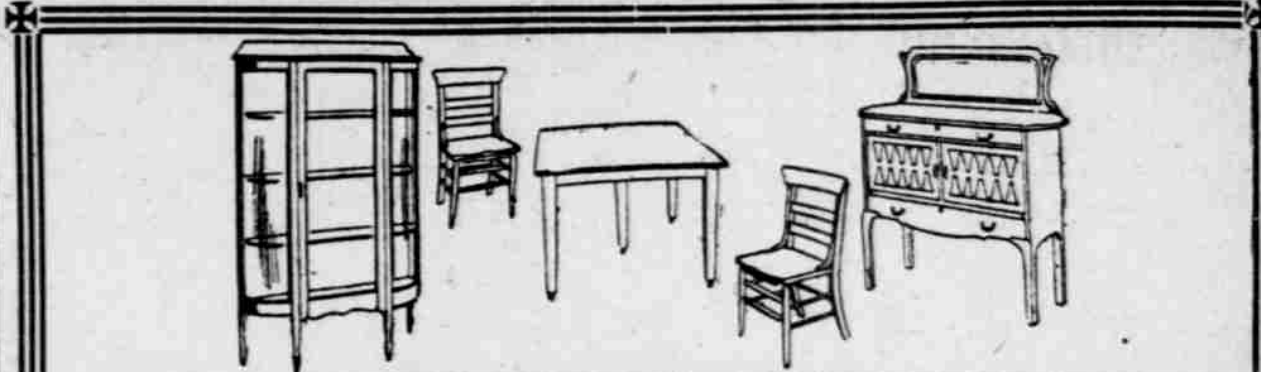
