Situation is Promising for American Shipments.

A report on the appale crops of Europe has been made by Michael Simons, a Glasgow fruit merchaen. Mr. Simons had just completed a lour of the English fruitgrowing districts and he wrote that he found more applied in the country than might have been expected.
