STATE CARE AND THE DEFECTIVES

Theme of Discussion of the Conference on State Charities.

PAPERS OF NOTE READ

Delegates Agree That Public Institutions Should Be but Temporary Homes for Children In- trusted to Their Care.

"The Proper Care of Defectives and Children by the State" was the subject which occupied the Tuesday sessions of the Conference of Charities and Corrections. It proved a fruitful topic and brought out some of the most interesting papers and discussions of the convention.

Makes Comprehensive Report. The report of Dr. H. A. Tomlinson, of St. Peter, Minn., for the committee on defectives was thorough and comprehensive, and Dr. Richard Dewey's paper on "After Care of Defectives" was equally so.

Dr. Walter Lindley's Address. The address delivered by Dr. Walter Lindley, of Los Angeles, before a sectional meeting at yesterday morning's session of the Conference of Charities and Correction, under the general heading of "The State-Saving Agencies of the Pacific States," was of particular interest to residents of the Coast States, especially Oregonians.

The speaker said that with a population about the same as Minnesota and about two-thirds that of Michigan, California had, June 1, 1904, in orphanages, 527 orphans, 289 had been abandoned children, 20 foundlings making a total of 836 dependent children in California institutions of various kinds.

Twentyeth Century Reformatory. "The Juvenile Reformatory of the Twentieth Century" was the title of the address delivered by Dr. Hastings Hart, of Chicago, superintendent of the Illinois Children's Home and Aid Society, and secretary of the National Conference at Tuesday morning's session. He declared: "The juvenile reformatory was at first, in reality, juvenile prisons, with prison bars, prison cells, prison guard, prison labor, prison discipline, prison terms, prison punishments and prison discipline generally. It was recognized as a legitimate part of the purpose of the institution to inflict upon the child punishment for his wrongdoing, adjusted according to the supposed ill desert of the culprit, and this idea was considered not to be inconsistent with the effort at reformation."

That was a drunken debacle, in which most of the natives were involved, and which resulted in murder. An investigation was made, but nothing ever done.

DEFENSE WAIVES ITS ARGUMENT

The jury may reasonably infer the joint assent of the minds of two or more persons to the prosecution of the unlawful enterprise; but the joint assent of the minds of the parties to a conspiracy may be found by the jury, like any other ultimate fact, as an inference from other facts proved.

Good Character Established.

The previous good character of the defendants has been established by the testimony, and is not controverted by the government. You will therefore consider the fact in the case, and not to be disregarded by you. Each defendant is entitled to the benefit of this fact through the operation of the previous good character of the defendant making the statement and such other defendant to commit the crime. You cannot in any other way consider the letters of Dr. Gesmer and other declarations made by him after the filing of the indictment, as applications against either of the defendants.
