FOUR MEN CHARGED WITH CON-SPIRACY TO DEFRAUD.

# Willard N. Jones, Thad, S. Potter, Daniel Clark and Ira Wade Are the Defendants.

William N. Jones, Thaddeus S. Potter, Daniel Clark and Ira Wade will, on Pri-day morning next, face the Federal Court day morning next, face the Federal Court to answer to a charge of conspiracy to defraud the United States in what is known as the Slictz case. The indictment against the defendants was returned on April 8, 1965, and charges that on April 15, 1962, the defendants conspired with a number of old solidiers to take up Gov-erument land in the Slictz Indian Reserva-tion, where the lands were open to settle-ment. By the terms of the conspiracy, as it is intended to be shown by the Government, Williard N, Jones and his associates procured a number of old sol-diers to use their rights of homestead entry in taking up a number of cholce chains in the reservation tract, under chains in the restruction tract, under the contract that the lands were to be turned over to Jones as soon as patented. For frequenting a house in which the


