

SEVEN HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS TO WINNER OF THE HANDICAP.

Seven Hundred and Fifty Dollars to Winner of the Handicap.

IRVINGTON MEET TODAY

Vexed Problem of Poolselling and Captain Spencer's Ultimatum and Sequences Which May Develop in the Game.

Out of the 42 nominations for the opening day handicap, valued at \$750 to the winner, only six will face Starter Fred Mulholland when he sends the field away this afternoon. Handicapper Horace Egbert in allowing weights will make Toolool carry 115 pounds. Corn Blossom, the mare that was touted so strongly as the winner of the Seattle Derby before the race, is in at the nice weight of 105 pounds. Sea Air will pick up 100 pounds, and Brinr Thorpe will carry 95 pounds. Judge has a weight that is 100 pounds. Epitrite is slated to carry a burden of 104 pounds and at the weights which have been assigned to all the starters they should all finish in a bunch. The entire card of six races, considering the fact that many of the starters were not unloaded and stabled at Irvington until late yesterday afternoon, will be one that will be hard to beat. There are some local favorites on the card, but for the most part they are new to Portland racetrack. The fifth race, the Oregon Handicap, carrying together the class of the sprinters in the track, Misty's Pride is a starter in this race and she will meet again Brinr Thorpe and Laidlaw, a pair of the best sprinters in the state. During the 45 days of racing, which will be held at Irvington, it is said that out of the 249 races, 120 will be won by local horses. Captain Spencer has been with the moral wave that has been sweeping the track since July 19, they will not do an unreasonably great deal of business. Captain Spencer says that he is not acting because W. S. Dixon, who owned the ring last year, is not in command this season. The story was told by Captain Dixon himself as stated above. Captain Spencer took up the fight for him. It is an unfortunate thing for the Portland racing game that this controversy arose at this late date. Captain Spencer at one time was president of the Multnomah Fair Association, and he held that position and was fully cognizant of the fact that there was pooling at the Irvington racetrack. He also knew when the lease for the track was made out to W. S. Dixon, Mrs. Elizabeth Ryan's nephew, that the track was to be used for racing, and he was not allowed to pool.
