ST. JOHN'S COUNCIL MEETS.

At the meeting of the St. John's Council last night, City Attorney S. H. Greene, filed papers alleging that Councilman C. D. Edwards, City Treasurer Fred F. Valentine and Marshall Meritt Hanks had become ineligible for their respective offices by reason of their becoming non-residents. On motion the consideration of these charges was postponed until the next regular meeting. Mayor King decided that Councilman Edwards could not vote on the matter in which he was interested. The whole question will now be fought out. At the close of the session of the bill of the Marshall Organ for \$250 was compromised by allowing him \$250.

SALVATION ARMY WEDDINGS.

The Salvation Army barracks at 100 Fourth street, was taxed to its fullest capacity last night upon the occasion of the marriage of Captain Thomas H. Stacey of Salem, and Lieutenant Alice Day, of Grant's Park, at present attached to the Fourth Corps of Portland. Brigadier W. F. Jenkins officiated. The newly-wedded couple will make their future home in Salem August 8. Ensign and Mrs. Kuhn, in charge of the Fourth Corps, will hold their farewell service, after which they will take their departure for Butte, Mont., and assume charge of the Army Corps at that place after ten months of successful work here.

DENIED CHARGE BUT PLEADED GUILTY.

M. R. Jones, a Montaville stockbroker, charged with selling tobacco to a minor, pleaded guilty before Judge Frazer yesterday, and was fined \$5. Jones denied that J. Dominick, the boy who accused him, had purchased any tobacco at his store, and stated that Dominick and another boy named Brand had stolen bottles of soda water from him. Jones also stated that he had given the boy a ride in his car, and that he would not pay him to employ an attorney, and fight the case. The boy Dominick, was recently before the Juvenile Court and was released on parole.

MAYOR UNDECIDED—ALEX SWEEK, attorney for August Erickson, held a consultation with Mayor Lane yesterday concerning the question of allowing the former orchestra to play at Erickson's saloon any longer. According to representations of council, Erickson contracted with the musicians to play at his place of business long before the present ban ordinance went into effect, and he feels that if he discharges them they will sue him for breach of contract, while if they continue to play the police will ruin his business by frequent raids. At last accounts the Mayor seemed undecided in the matter.

VIRGINIA MAZE REPORT.

John Kelly, viewed by a committee of the City Council June 11 in the matter of the proposed laying out and establishing of East Twelfth street across the Oregon & California Railroad Company's right of way to a connection with "A" street in Tibbett's homestead, have filed their report with the City Auditor whereby it appears that the benefits assessed to the various property-owners along the route aggregate \$273.70, which cover the damages to the railway corporation, assessed on the expense of engineering, amounting to \$2.

DEEDS SALE COMPLETED.

The north-west corner of the block on Tenth and Morrison streets, 50x100, was yesterday sold by Joseph Buchtel for the owners, Miss A. L. Dimick and sisters and Mrs. E. M. Edwards to Mrs. Sarah M. Tilford, of Portland, for \$5,000. The deed was delivered yesterday afternoon. Miss Dimick's share of the purchase price is \$2,500 and Mrs. Edwards \$2,500. Miss A. L. Dimick is principal of the Brooklyn school. The property has been held in the family for a number of years.

CASE SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

Goldapp plaintiff in the lawsuit against James A. Cutwell, a forcible entry and detainer case in the East Side court, was settled by a compromise. The first part of the case was decided in favor of Defendant Cutwell, who had \$25 in the hands of Justice Jackson. The settlement Cutwell paid Goldapp \$12 rent and \$5 costs. The case was settled after both parties had paid their costs.

REGENTS SUSTAIN

DR. WILLYCOMBE

Attempt to Force His Resignation From Agricultural College Fails.

THE VOTE STANDS 7 TO 4

Minority of Regents Holds That His Aspirations for Nomination as Governor Interfere With His Official Duties.

At the annual meeting of the Board of Regents of the State Agricultural College, held at Corvallis July 13, quite an animated discussion arose relative to the attitude of James Willycombe, director of the experimental station at the college, in connection with his announced candidacy for gubernatorial honors.

Some of the regents were of the opinion that Dr. Willycombe was not attending properly to his official duties on this account, and the sentiment against his political ambitions took the form of a resolution introduced by Regent W. F. Keady to the effect that the interests of the college were paramount to any individual interests, and inasmuch as Dr. Willycombe had announced himself as a candidate for a high political office, thus neglecting his duties at the college to subvert his personal aspirations, it was resolved that he either refrain from taking an active part in politics or else resign.

The resolution was supported by Regents Keady, Weatherford, Pierce and Daly, while Regents Apperson, Irvine, Yates, Dunbar, Ackerman, Oswald and Leedy opposed it, with the result that it failed to carry.

Regent Daly stated last night that the four regents who supported the resolution did not entertain any personal feeling in the matter, merely concluding that if Dr. Willycombe was going to run for office he ought to quit his present position and give it to somebody who could attend to business.

On June 26, the City Council passed a resolution notifying the Consolidated Railway Company of the intention of the municipality to improve all that part of Williams Avenue from the north line of McMillen to the north line of Morris street, by grading the street to the proper sub-grade, constructing artificial stone curbs, paving the roadway with Warren's bitulithic pavement, except that portion occupied by the street railway company as a right of way, which shall be improved by replacing the rails now in use with grooved rails not less than seven inches in depth, paving the space between the rails and one foot outside of the rails with stone blocks set on concrete, and grouted with cement mortar.

As a reply the Portland Consolidated Railway Company contends that the City Council is laboring under a misapprehension of the conditions relative to the improvement of Williams avenue. It claims that some two years ago their tracks on this street were relaid with rails weighing more than 50 pounds per yard, which the weight required by their franchise. The joints were cast-iron and the work done in a substantial and permanent manner. It is alleged, under the direction of City Engineer Elliott, who provided the necessary stakes for grade and alignment. The railway company contends further that the track will remain in good operating condition for many years, and that it would be an unnecessary hardship and a great loss and damage to them if they were forced to relay it in the manner contemplated by the resolution of the City Council.

Council for the railway corporation advises that they have complied with the terms of their franchise and that nothing more can be legally required of them. The council also announced willingness in return for the rescinding of the resolution by the City Council, to lay a concrete foundation in that portion of the street occupied by their tracks, and upon this foundation to place a Warren bitulithic pavement, similar in all respects to that required on the remaining portion of the street, except that they will add the concrete foundation at their own expense, and place stone blocks on each side of the rails.

The railway company officials think that such a pavement would be more satisfactory than the one now in use. They also stated that the corporation was causing considerable delay to the contractors on account of the city's inability to accept the work in its present shape, the committee recommending that the city would have a tendency to bring the corporation to terms.
