OREGON HOP CROP PLACED AT 85,000 BALES BY E. J. SMITH.

Examined Yards in Salem and Independence Districts-Property of H. J. Ottenheimer.

PORTLAND. July 28. — (To the Editor.)

—On Tuesday of this week in company with H. J. Ottenheimer, Jaseph Harris. Mr. Carmichael, all of Salem and the two Cunningham brothers, of Ukish Cal., I took a drive through the Independence district, and en route we examined several hoppards. While the crop looked good in this district, it was apparently a top crup. As there are no blossoms on the long arms at all Independence is today considered the choice district of Oregon and practically free from vernin.

On the trip we visited Mr. Ottenheimer's famous ranch, and for one to appreciate the thorough-going, systematic business shiftly of Mr. Ottenheimer he should visit this extensive hop ranch at Independence, which is one of the choicest properties of this kind in the state. The yards are most thoroughly cultivated. The crups look heavy, and Mr. Ottenheimer predicts a yield of 2500 pounds to the acre on a portion of his yards. The yards on this ranch show what thorough cultivation and careful spraying does for a crop.

On Wednesday 'I visited several yards in the Salem district where I found all late reports as to damage to the crop fully justified. Many yards are highted and practically dead, while other yards in the same district that have been properly sprayed look good with a top crop in evidence everywhere.

I now feel fully justified in lowering my setimate of the Oregon crup from 100,000 to \$5,000 bales and if had crop conditions continue for ten days lenger, this estimate can again be safely lowered. Messrs. Pincus and Lachmund, of Salem, have some unusually choice yards on their fine ranch which show a high and thorough state of cultivation.
