CHICAGO, July 31—Influenced by bullish news by cable, the wheat market opened firm, September being up 1/4 at 84 1/2.

The chief factor was a practical failure of crops in a majority of the grain-growing districts in Russia, the crops in 41 out of 60 provinces of the southern districts being total failures, according to a London newspaper. Soon after the opening here, the market gained additional strength on a weather bureau prediction of frost tonight in Southern Minnesota.
