and Prices Are Higher, NEW TORK, Aug. 3 .- The inon trade genally continues in a very sound and ctory condition, says the Iron Age. buying in the Southern field is over the present, and in the leading distributing markets Bouthern iron is slightly easter since some of the smaller companies are willing to sell on the basis of \$11.50 for Birmingham. The larger interests who cold heavily lately are asking better prices. A lot of 18000 tons of gray forge was sold for Pittsburg delivery at a rather low price.
