WILL LOOK INTO VANCOUVER AVENUE.

N. L. Perry, Albiest, member of the Executive Board, will look up the records concerning the improvement of Vancouver between McMillan and Russell streets. Mr. Perry is under the impression that the proceedings for this improvement have been piecemeal. Bids for this improvement were twice called for, but the matter went no further, and Mr. Perry will investigate the situation. Upper Albiestina wants an improved street parallel with Williams avenue, and Vancouver avenue is the longest and most available thoroughfare.

RELIEVE WATER FANES IN ARLETA.

A large water main is being laid from the well recently dug near Leas toward the elevated reservoir at Arleta, which will relieve the water fanes in that district. This main is ten inches in diameter. It is announced that a pump with a capacity to deliver 1000 gallons per minute is to be installed. The well is about two miles from the reservoir. The district to be supplied embraces nearly 3000 people. George W. Brown is putting in this plant.

DONATE PART OF ESTATE—M. L. Holbrook and wife have filed their donation of portions of Philadelphia and Jersey streets in St. Johns to the public. This was done through an arrangement with the St. Johns Council, and for the purpose of cutting off a sharp point at the intersection of these two streets. Mr. Holbrook gets a concession from this project.

REVOKE LICENSES—Mayor Lane and Chief of Police Gritzmacher have under advisement the matter of recommending to the City Council, at its meeting Wednesday, the revocation of the licenses of the Senate saloon, in the North-East district, and of Richards' restaurant, Seventh and Alder streets. GIFT TO TRAVELERS' AID

Twelve Hundred and Fifty Dollars From National Organization.

THE TRAVELERS' AID ASSOCIATION, which has done thorough work assisting and caring for women and girls who have drifted into Portland unprotected during the Exposition, has received a gift of \$1250 from the American committee of the national organization. This line of work has been carried on in Exposition cities for many years and is constantly increasing. Portland women became interested in the fate of the many women and girls who would come here this Summer and decided to take up the work on their own responsibility. The association has a success from its inception, but after the funds with which it was started became exhausted the work has been continued with difficulty, but never abandoned. The recognition by the American committee of the good being done by the Portland organization is gratifying to those who have personally labored all Summer in the effort to save the girls and close up questionable resorts which were a menace to them, and the substantial amount which accompanied the recognition makes it possible not only to continue the work but to broaden its scope. It is hoped to continue it after the Fair, for it is a class of work which has never before been systematically done in this city. The good effects have been recognized by all.

THE JUVENILE COURT has been materially assisted by the Travelers' Aid Association in the Summer of 1905. The chief of the court, Mrs. Lola Baldwin, having been given a probation officer without cost to the court. Many women and girls have been cared for temporarily, positions procured for some and others sent to their homes at the expense of the association. All this takes money and a systematic canvass of the city will be held this evening at 7:45 at the Y. W. C. A. parlors, Sixth and Oak, at which arrangements will probably be made for entertaining Miss Helen Gould when she visits Portland in October. Miss Gould has long been keenly interested in Travelers' Aid work and has materially assisted its maintenance for many years.
