

KEEPS BACK NAME

President Will Not Announce Oregon Judge.

HAS MOODY'S NOMINATION

Appointment May Be Delayed Some Time—Kaneke Again Calls on President, but Keeps His Purpose Secret.

OYSTER BAY, N. Y., Aug. 14.—Attorney-General Moody has made to the President the recommendation of a successor to the late Judge Beiling, United States District Judge for the District of Oregon, but the appointment, it is stated, may not be announced for some time.

Baron Kaneke, who on a previous trip to Oyster Bay described himself as a Japanese of leisure sojourning in America because he liked this country, was the only caller on President Roosevelt today. This was the third visit he had made to Sagamore Hill within a few weeks and he saw the President frequently in Washington during the early summer. He arrived here on a late afternoon train, drove to Sagamore Hill with Acting Secretary Barnes, had a brief chat with the President and took an evening train for New York.

Neither he nor President Roosevelt would discuss the nature of his call, although Baron Kaneke insisted that it had nothing to do with the pending peace negotiations between Russia and Japan.

Accompanied by members of his family, the President went today to Jaynes Hill, about six miles from Sagamore Hill, for a few hours' outing. He did not take up any executive business until his return late in the afternoon. A letter received here from Secretary Loeb, who with Mrs. Loeb has been sojourning for a month in the Yellowstone Park region, indicates that he will return to Oyster Bay next Saturday or Sunday.

FULTON DENIES HE GAVE NAME

Despite His Denial, He Wrote Friend Bean Would Be Appointed.

ASTORIA, Or., Aug. 14.—(Special)—Senator Fulton this evening declined to make any statement regarding the appointment of a United States Judge for the District of Oregon, further than to deny the reports that he has told anyone that Justice Bean or any other particular man will be selected.

Senator Fulton is known to have written a letter to a political supporter in Salem saying that he (the person addressed) would be pleased with the appointment of Justice Bean, would be pleased to see Bean, the recipient of the letter could place no other construction on it.

MORE AIR-BRAKES ON TRAINS

Interstate Commission Will Increase Minimum to Prevent Accidents.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The Interstate Commerce Commission is about to take steps to require all railroads engaged in interstate commerce to increase the minimum percentage of air-brakes used on freight trains to as great an extent as conditions of equipment will permit.

The Commission has become impressed with the danger attending the operations of freight trains on which an insufficient number of cars are equipped with air-brakes operated by the engineer. Recent accidents involving loss of life and property caused by the "buckling" of freight trains—the rear cars crowding forward upon those in front—when emergency applications of air have been made on trains carrying unbraked cars, have demonstrated that such trains are not actually under the control of the engineer, as required by law. As the impact which causes a "buckling" is due to the presence of unbraked cars in the rear of the train, it appears to the Commission that such accidents may be obviated by requiring a number of cars in trains greater than the 50 per cent now required by law to have their brakes operated by the engineer. Increase in the minimum is authorized by law.

HYDE'S HEALTH IS HIS EXCUSE

Has Carbuncle Which Prevents Return to Give Evidence.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The promised letter from John Hyde, former statistician of the Department of Agriculture, in response to Secretary Wilson's cablegram urging him to return from England and testify in the proceedings before the special grand jury which is investigating charges against Edwin S. Holmes, the former associate statistician, arrived today. The letter was as indefinite as Hyde's recent cablegram to Secretary Wilson, and it is known that he has intentions beyond his promise to return as soon as possible.

In the absence of Secretary Wilson, who has gone to Chicago, the letter was turned over to District Attorney Beach, who authorized its publication. It is dated Southampton, England, August 8, and is as follows: "Dear Sir—Your cablegram of July 27 reached me by mail from London, August 2. As I stated in my reply, I will return as soon as possible. A brief delay is unavoidable. The carbuncle from which I suffered shortly after leaving Washington has been followed by a much more serious one, and I am in bad shape altogether. As I wish to avoid going over a third time, I must also see the specialist whom I came over to consult. I have not yet been within 200 miles of London, and the statement that I was attending the Convention of the Statistical Institute was a mistake."

SAILOR KILLED WHILE BOXING

Board of Inquiry Finds Death Was Purely Accidental.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The Navy Department has received the report of the board of inquiry, which investigated the death of Raphael Cohen, a sailor on the cruiser Yankee, who, according to a report made to the department July 10 by Rear-Admiral Bradford, commanding the squadron to which the Yankee is attached, died as the result of a blow received in a boxing contest. The board found the cause to be accidental, and recommended that no further action be had.

Murdered by Drunken Companions.

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 14.—A dispatch to the Record from Billings says a member of the Red Lodge company of militia

was murdered on the train by his companions, many of whom were intoxicated when the train left Billings this morning. The murdered man's name is not known.

Damage to Collier Lebanon.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—A report to the Navy Department from the Commandant of the Navy Yard at Portsmouth, N. H., on the recent accident to the collier Lebanon, says that vessel was damaged while a test was being made with air pressure. The Commandant estimated that six weeks would be required to repair the damage. The Lebanon was being fitted up for destroying derelicts.

Contract for Custom-House.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14.—The contract for the construction of the new custom-house at San Francisco has been awarded to Thomas Butler, of that city, at his bid of \$1,940,000, the building to be completed by March 1, 1908.

Rural Carriers at Airlie.

FRENCH CLAIMS CUT DOWN

VENEZUELA GETS OFF WITH PAYING ONE-THIRTEENTH.

Referee Decides Question by Awarding \$636,212 to Claimants for \$8,215,245.

NORTHFIELD, Vt., Aug. 14.—Claims aggregating more than \$250,000 held by the French Government against Venezuela have been allowed by Referee Frank Plumley, of this place, to whom they had been referred for a decision and final adjudication. Mr. Plumley's decision was announced here today to the representatives of the two governments, Count Perit de la Rocca and Dr. Jean de J. Paul.

Eight cases, involving claims of 45,000 francs against the Government of Venezuela, were submitted to Mr. Plumley. Of the eight cases, two were dismissed for want of equity and one was disallowed.

The claims were for damages alleged to have been sustained by French citizens conducting mercantile enterprises in Venezuela during the insurrection of 1901. Mr. Plumley's decision is final.

The claims dismissed by Mr. Plumley for want of equity were those of Thome, erick & Co., of the case of the French Government, the former was for 175,000 francs and that of Massin for 207,515 francs. The Venezuelan Commission had already rejected these claims and he was supported in his contention by Mr. Plumley.

The claim disallowed, one of the largest presented, was that of Antoine Fabian, of the case of the French Government, who would be paid any part of the claim.

The exact aggregate of the claims presented was \$8,215,245; the total amount awarded to five claimants, \$636,212. The French government, by the referee was awarded \$64,852, given to the Company General of Orinoco, on a claim of \$1,489,567. The heaviest reduction made in any claim was \$1,489,567.

The decision of the referee was made final by the terms of the protocol between the two countries, under which they agreed to leave to the decision of an umpire the contested claims.

Mr. Plumley was chosen, it is believed, on account of his connection with the British-Venezuelan mixed commission, which sat at Caracas in 1901 in connection with which opinions given by him are said to have established two precedents in international law.

The referee announced his decision orally and presented each of the claimants with two copies of the awards in writing and two copies of his written opinions in each case for use by the respective governments. The awards will become a matter of record to be made by the secretary in three record-books, one for each government and the third for the referee. There will be two meetings of the commission tomorrow for the attestation of the records and for the disposal of other formal matters.
