FORM PUNK CLUB—Fifty or more resi-  
 dents of the southeast district, including  
 Arleta and the surrounding territory, or-  
 ganized a punk club Saturday night in  
 the hall at Arleta, with W. A. Schelling  
 as president. There was an extended dis-  
 cussion of the water famine and the  
 appointment of appropriate committees  
 to investigate the matter. One com-  
 mittee has already received assurances  
 from George W. Brown, who is enlarging  
 the water plant in the district, that  
 within a month he will be able to supply  
 an abundance of pure water from the  
 well recently sunk at Mount Scott. He  
 said he is now laying a 10-inch water  
 main to the reservoir near Arleta. There  
 will be another meeting of the club Fri-  
 day night next, to hear reports from the  
 various committees appointed at the first  
 meeting.

WILL HAVE ASSEMBLY HALL—Stephens  
 school building is now being completed.  
 The four unfurnished rooms in the annex  
 built last year are being finished, and  
 will be furnished for the Fall opening.  
 In the center on the lower floor an ample  
 assembly hall is being provided by re-  
 moving the stairways and cutting out  
 one classroom. This gives a large as-  
 sembly hall fairly well lighted. The  
 Stephens, under this arrangement, will  
 contain 19 classrooms and a new assembly  
 hall, which will make it one of the largest  
 schoolhouses in the city. It is designed  
 to relieve some of the other buildings  
 that are crowded. It will draw from  
 the Brooklyn building, which was some-  
 what crowded last year.

IN dramatized form "Audrey" devotes  
 sufficiently from the novel which was  
 one of the "six best sellers" two or three  
 years ago, to enable the heroine to live  
 and to be happy ever afterward. This is  
 done to appease the average hankering  
 for a happy ending, but it is questionable  
 if the play does not lose strength by this  
 concession. In the book "Audrey" dies  
 most dramatically by the hand of the  
 half-caste French trapper, because, for-  
 sooth, she declines to become his blushing  
 bride. In the play she lives most theatri-  
 cally to become wife of the man who  
 should in all reason have married Evelyn  
 Byrd. Perhaps it is better so for the  
 audience gathers up its wraps in a much  
 happier frame of mind than were it the  
 other way.

The play "Audrey" is an interesting one  
 though far from being a great one. In its  
 way it reflects the spirit of early colonial  
 days in Virginia very well. The cavalier,  
 the plowman, the renaissance, the per-  
 fumed macaronies and the feminine  
 beauty and fashion of old Williamsburg  
 and Jamestown all are in it. Some of the  
 characters are from real history. To this  
 day in Virginia they will point out the  
 grave of Evelyn Byrd, who, tradition ex-  
 plains, died a broken-hearted spinster.  
 Westover still stands much as it did in  
 the days when bluff old Colonel Byrd,  
 the Gooches, Lees and the Lightfoots  
 danced and made merry within its walls.  
 Saved for the names, however, there is no  
 attempt to lug history into the play, for  
 which we should give thanks. It is a  
 love story with melodramatic trimmings,  
 that and nothing more.

The Belasco management. In producing it  
 is deserving of our commendation for its  
 decidedly expensive and fraught with  
 difficulty. The opening act alone must  
 run the cost of the production up to a  
 dangerous figure for it is beautiful and  
 elaborate in the extreme. The excellent  
 costumes of the piece throughout en-  
 title it to unusual respect and interest.  
 Sainpolis, may justly feel proud of his  
 work in staging it so splendidly and cor-  
 rectly.

This is Eugene Ormonde's last week  
 as leading man and the many favors

 he is held and the general regret at  
 his approaching departure. He was an  
 effective Howard.

Naturally interest centered on Lucia  
 Moore. In the title part, her Audrey  
 is not the best thing she has done here  
 but it grades up well toward her bet-  
 ter efforts. Somehow she seems just  
 to miss the right grip on the part by  
 a hair's breadth. She is a shade more  
 unnatural than a most immature  
 child of nature should be. I shall  
 quarrel with her about it, however. It's  
 a trying engagement and even Eleanor  
 Robson gave it up after a little time.  
 The return of Edith Angus to the  
 local stage made last night's performance  
 of more than usual importance.  
 Miss Angus is decidedly popular here  
 and deserves to be for she's a capital  
 young actress. She was accorded a most  
 hearty demonstration and received  
 enough flowers to dress a church for a  
 wedding. It is good to have her back  
 with us after a long and serious ill-  
 ness and the consequent enforced re-  
 tirement. Her performance was all that  
 the part permitted. Virginia Brissac  
 again scored as the unhappy Evelyn.  
 John Sainpolis was quite at his natu-  
 ral and gave an average performance.  
 Jean, while Clarence Montaine made  
 a most admirable feature of the play of  
 his Rev. Gideon Darden, the disolute  
 rector, Ralph Bell lifted a minor role  
 up to vastly greater importance than  
 the dramatists evidently conceived. Mr.  
 Bell is showing signs of real genius.  
 He will be watching. There's materi-  
 al for a great, big actor there—some  
 day.

The rest of the cast did little but  
 wear good clothes and party manners.
