

IS STROGGING SPOTS

Chinese Boycott Only Serious at Shanghai.

CANTON ALSO ILL-DISPOSED

European Merchants, Who at First Hailed Boycott With Joy, Now Fear Movement Against All Foreigners.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—Despatches received at the State Department today from China show that Shanghai is the only place where the boycott against American goods has assumed anything like a serious aspect. At Canton the movement has made some headway, but at other points it has not been successful. This information was supplied in response to instructions sent some days ago to Minister Kockhill and the consular officers in China to keep the State Department advised as to the progress of the boycott. One dispatch on this subject received today was not made public at the State Department, but sent to the President at Oyster Bay.

ONLY A PRIVATE ENTERPRISE

Chinese Official Says Government Is Not Concerned With Boycott.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—Among the passengers on the steamship Mongolia, which has arrived here from the Orient, is Wong Kai Kah, Chinese Imperial Trade Commissioner, accompanied by his secretary. He is going to Washington, it is stated that the object of his trip is to discuss the boycott and the proposed new exclusion treaty.

The Mongolia brings news that the boycott is stated in Honolulu to have had its origin there, where it was urged among Chinese as long ago as February, 1934. Ching Yee On, editor of a local Chinese daily paper, which has some circulation in various parts of China, claims to have been the originator of the movement. A year and a half ago he urged such action upon his countrymen, on the ground that their government was not strong enough to resist the treatment being given by Americans to Chinese having a right to travel in America.

The steamer Mongolia, which was in Amoy on July 15, had some difficulty in getting Chinese coolies to work on her cargo. The boycott was to have been declared the following day.

He wishes to impress on the American people that the Chinese government has nothing to do with the boycott of American goods, and says that this "is a private enterprise" on the part of the merchants and the gentry of the Flowery Kingdom, and is the result of our treatment of the favored classes who come to this country. He said today:

"I shall probably go to the different commercial centers which have trade with our country. I have nothing to do with the boycott, nor is my mission to the United States with reference to it. I want it to be understood that there is not an official Chinese who has anything to do with the boycott, and, as a last word, I may say that it is the earnest desire of my government to have the most friendly relations with the United States."

Wong Kai Kah was extremely curious as to the peace negotiations, and expressed a hope that the war would soon be brought to a close. He seemed to be greatly relieved when the news of the return to China of Manchuria, and of the open-door policy.

BOYCOTT ON ALL FOREIGNERS

British and German Merchants' Joy Is Changed to Fear.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15.—From a measure which was apparently originated by the Chinese in the hope of buttressing the United States into modifying its administration of the Chinese exclusion laws, it has become a movement which is now being developed into a situation which is giving all foreigners residing in the Flowery Kingdom a great deal of concern.

Merchants of other countries at first hailed with secret joy the idea that American goods were to be shut out of competition with English and German and other manufactures, but it is now feared that the boycott movement may turn into an expression of general antipathy to all foreigners, which may have results as serious as during the Mexican uprising of 1900. Foreigners are now joining with the importers of American goods, and the Chinese officials, to have the movement suppressed.

This intelligence was emphasized today by the receipt, at the State Department, of a dispatch from Mr. Rogers, Consul-General at Shanghai, who said the boycott situation is unchanged, but that the apprehension among the foreigners is increasing. The Department stated that the last dispatch from Mr. Rogers was to the effect that this apprehension is one of fear that the boycott will develop into a revolutionary movement like that of the Boxers, five years ago.

Consul-General Rogers' last dispatch said that foreigners were apprehensive, but no explanation of the phrase was obtainable from the Department. At the same time it was admitted that a circular dispatch had been sent by the Department to Mr. Rocaill and the members of the Consular service requiring them to keep the Department promptly informed of any new phase in the boycott situation.

OFFICIALS CAUSED BOYCOTT

Discourteous Treatment of Exempt Classes Angered Whole of China.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 15.—J. W. Davidson, Acting Consul-General at Shanghai, who arrived from the Orient today, says that the cause of the Chinese boycott is the discourteous treatment which the sons of influential Chinese officials have received at the hands of immigration officials on landing at San Francisco.

Mr. Davidson thought that the fact that orders had already been placed for six months ahead for delivery of American goods would prevent the boycott from being successful, but he admitted that a popular anti-foreign feeling might be aroused which would carry the fight beyond control and result in serious consequences. "The purpose of the boycott," he said, "has never been to secure the admission of coolies, but to gain proper treatment of the exempt classes."

Eagles Will Revise Ritual.

DENVER, Aug. 15.—The eighth annual meeting of the Grand Aerie of the Fraternal Order of Eagles, which began here today, promises to open a new epoch in the history of this popular youth fraternity. The ritual is to be wholly revised along Masonic lines, so as to place the order on a firmer basis, and greater restrictions will be placed on

membership, although no occupations will be barred. Another important matter under consideration is the establishment of a home.

A public reception was given to officers and members of the Grand Aerie at the Tabor-Grand Opera-House this forenoon. The auditorium was packed. Welcoming addresses were made by Governor Joseph P. McDonald, Mayor Robert W. Speer, Dr. W. H. Sharpley, worthy president Denver Aerie, No. 35, and other citizens.

REFORM WAVE HITS GUAM

Uncle Sam's Smallest Island Reorganizes Its Government.

AGANA, Guam, July 22, via San Francisco, Aug. 15.—A board appointed by the Governor, consisting of Lieutenant R. S. Douglas, as chairman; G. D. Lehnman, executive secretary, and the Rev. Padre Jose Patomo, has been in session during the greater part of the month, having under advisement the financial condition of the island, the salaries of insular officials, the distribution of duties and the desirable changes to be instituted in the administration of island affairs.

A number of changes under the recommendation of this board, it is contemplated, will soon be put into effect. Among others the disbanding of the insular artillery, now the only police in the island, and the substitution thereof of a suitable constabulary; a reorganization of the judiciary, whereby the Supreme Court becomes the Court of Appeals and is brought as near to the jury system as the circumstances attending the present; reformation of the prison laws and of public work performed by the prisoners; changes in the accountability system of the treasury and the extension of the government apprentice and training system.

On July 3 telephone communication was opened through Guam to Suma. It is now proposed to hasten connections with the more remote and inaccessible districts of Agat, Maricao and Inarajan. A strenuous effort is also being made to extend the roads of the island to the outlying districts. Good progress has been made during the past year and a small sum of money provided by Congress has been used for the purpose.

The installation of wireless telegraphy has progressed rapidly during the last month, under the direction of Lieutenant George C. Sweet and a corps of electricians who were sent out with the necessary material in the Solara.

The Norwegian steamer Norge, laden with barley and flour, has cleared from Tula Tula. There is a rumor that her cargo is intended for the Russians in Manchuria.

An artificial boat channel is in progress of construction between the harbors of Agat and Piti and is nearing completion.

On July 6 construction of a causeway from the mainland to the island of Cabras, on which the Government coal pile is situated, was begun. This will vastly facilitate the convenience of supplying coal both to ships and the naval station when completed.

SOLVING MURDER MYSTERY

Marsh Arrested as Dove, Suspected of Chicago's Automobile Crime.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—The Inter Ocean says today: A warrant has been issued charging George Lawrence, alias Bennett Marsh, formerly employed as a chauffeur for various well-known Chicagoans, with the murder of William Bate, the young chauffeur, whose car was found leaning over the steering gear of an automobile at a lonely spot two and a half miles beyond Glenview on the morning of November 11.

John V. Bate, of Racine, Wis., father of the victim of the celebrated murder mystery, arrived in Chicago from Racine today to assist with Chief of Police Collins, confident that he has discovered the mysterious "Mr. Dove." Detective Sheehan left for Brockton, Mass., Thursday for the purpose of bringing Marsh back.

With Detective Sheehan went Peter J. Startz, a telegraph operator employed in the Santa Fe Railway station at Rock Island, who was with "Mr. Dove" four hours on the morning following the murder.

Chief of Police Collins today telegraphed the chief of police of Brockton to arrest Marsh.

After he had heard of the statement of Joy Morton, former employer of George Lawrence, Chief Collins tonight expressed lack of faith in the theory that Lawrence or Marsh is the murderer of Bate. The statement of Morton, to the effect that Lawrence, known to him as Marsh, was employed by him from November 2, until December 12, tends to establish an alibi for Lawrence.

"I cannot be positive that Lawrence is the man who committed the crime, although many circumstances indicate that he is," said the Chief.

MARSH FOUND IN BROCKTON

Admits He Was With Bate, but Not at the Time of Death.

BROCKTON, Mass., Aug. 15.—George L. Marsh was arrested at his home here this afternoon at the request of the Chicago police in connection with the murder of William Bate on November 15, 1934. The arrest was made after the authorities had received a telegram stating that Marsh had been arrested and had been taken to Chicago.

EXPERTON GROUND

Dr. Guiteras Studies Yellow Fever in New Orleans.

KNOWS ITS CUBAN HAUNTS

Will Aid in Campaign—Decreased Number of New Cases and Deaths—Two Cases From South in Indiana.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 15.—The arrival of Dr. John Guiteras, the Cuban yellow fever expert, and his tour of the seat of worst infection, was the most interesting feature of the yellow fever situation today. Dr. Guiteras left Havana to make an inspection of the Gulf cities in connection with the Cuban quarantine and to offer his assistance in the campaign to progress here. His previous important visit to New Orleans was in 1927, when there was also an appearance of yellow fever and when the mosquito theory had not been determined. On his arrival Dr. Guiteras had an interview with Surgeon White, of the Marine Hospital Service.

Dr. Guiteras expects to see here universal acceptance of the mosquito theory at the end of the present campaign.

The situation today again shows an improvement, both as to new cases and deaths. Encouragement is especially found in the reduction of new foci. An analysis of the report of the 24 hours ending August 14, showed eight new foci.

A draft for \$25,000 was received today to be put at the disposal of the Marine Hospital Service. All the money needed is available to carry on the work.

Next Sunday a day of rest will be observed as a general distinction, an appeal asking every person having an inclosure of any nature to fumigate on that day, burning sulphur for at least two hours.

New cases continue to appear from day to day in the state, but there is no general or violent spread of the pestilence outside of the original center of infection, Alabama and Mississippi continue free from the disease, three suspicious cases at Raymond, Miss., being pronounced not yellow fever.

TWO CASES IN INDIANA

Two Arrivals From South Have Yellow Fever.

LA PORTE, Ind., Aug. 15.—Mrs. Fred Schreier, of Waterford, this county, who recently returned from the South, where her two sisters died from what was called swamp fever, was today reported fatally ill with a disease which her physicians diagnosed as yellow fever.

INDIANAPOLIS, Aug. 15.—The state health authorities, this afternoon, sent Dr. A. R. Brayton, an expert, to Crawfordsville, to diagnose the disease of a man who arrived at Crawfordsville a few days ago from Paro, Miss. B. M. Hutchings, secretary of the Board of Health, had diagnosed the case as yellow fever.

Fever Causes Banana Famine.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—With the visible supply of bananas reduced to less than half the usual amount, because of the restrictions on importation made by the quarantine at New Orleans, wholesale dealers along South Water street are predicting a famine in the fruit. Prices during the last two weeks have shown a steady rise, until they about double what they were a month ago, and the demand is greater than the supply.

The best bananas could be bought a month ago for \$1.50 a bunch, said a well-known South Water street commission man last evening. "They are now bringing \$2 and we can't get enough of them for our customers," he said. The Chicago dealers usually sell about 60,000 bunches a week, but at present the sales will not exceed 20,000 bunches.

ALL OPPOSE FEEDING LAW

Cattle and Railroad Men Unite in Protests to Wilson.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—Secretary of Agriculture Wilson held a conference today with about 50 cattlemen at the stockyards exchange on the subject of livestock transportation. The cattlemen made it plain that they were opposed to the law which requires shippers to feed and rest cattle every 24 hours. They wanted it extended to 36 hours.

The ranchmen argued that it distresses cattle more and does them more harm to take them from the cars every 24 hours than it does to allow them to remain in a car for a day and a half.

Mr. Wilson told the stockmen, who came from Texas, Idaho, Montana, Colorado and Iowa, that he could not change the law, but he agreed to modify the order which now limits the number of cattle in cars when they are fed on the journey.

"As to feeding the cattle in cars," said the Secretary, "there is not enough of the right kind of cars to make that general." The stockmen represented today that the recent order limiting the number of cattle in cars that are so arranged that feeding is possible was a hardship and needed modifying.

The railroads also contend that unloading every 36 hours is often enough. A committee of operating and traffic men was appointed to join with cattle feeders in presenting the matter to Mr. Wilson. The Government has filed 1200 suits

BRIEF TELEGRAPHIC NEWS

Charles M. Schwab is going abroad for the purpose of investigating in Germany a new and secret process for the manufacture of steel, which may have bearing on the future of that industry.

Herbert Mills, formerly treasurer of the Jarvis-Conklin Mortgage Trust Company, of Kansas City, jumped or fell from a window in the Bethany Hospital at Kansas City Monday night and died shortly after.

Smoke is issuing from the crater named Mokuawewe on the island of Hawaii. This is one of the outlets high on the slopes of Mauna Loa, from which the last lava flow of that mountain came, about two years ago.

When Policeman Hale, of New York, told John Hogan to move on, Hogan attacked him with an ax and clubbed him into submission and took him to jail. A mob of Hogan's friends then stormed the jail, but was dispersed.

The experiments made with wireless telegraphy on engines running over the tracks of the Chicago & Alton Railroad have proved so successful that the management has taken steps to equip all the engines of the company with the apparatus.

J. H. Rhodes, a photographer of Roxbury, Mass., claims \$12,000,000 from the Bank of England as the accumulation of \$800 deposited 30 years ago by George Rhodes, one of the founders of the Jamestown colony. The bank has offered to settle for \$75,000.

The Japanese Merchants' Association of Hawaii will bring suit to test the validity of the territorial law that none but citizens, or persons eligible to become citizens, shall be employed on public contracts in the United States. Attorney says the law is in violation of the treaty with Japan.

The Standard Oil Company has declared a dividend for the quarter of \$6 a share, payable September 15. The previous dividends were \$9 a share, payable June 15, and \$15 a share payable March 15; \$20 a share declared so far this year, against \$29 a share in the corresponding period last year.

Mrs. Virginia Hernandez, half-sister of Jacob S. Rogers, the locomotive builder, has brought suit to recover \$1,000,000 and accumulated profits, which she says her father invested with Rogers for her. Rogers left his estate, valued at \$5,000,000, to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, of New York.

The noncommissioned officers and men of the Italian cruiser Dogali, which is anchored at Port Lee, N. Y., were given a banquet by the Italian Socialist Union of New York, on Sunday night, when slips of paper urging them to desert were circulated. The officers denounced the plot and arrested all the banqueters on their return to the ship.
