The weather is all grain. Winter wheat cutting is nearly com-pleted, and considerable threshing has been done, with very good yields both in quantity and quality. The cutting of Spring wheat is well along; probably three-fourths dos-cept in late localities, in some of wi-will linger until the end of the month. present appearances the yield will be a mone, of excellent quality, the falling off from the early expectations of an unusually large yield being due to the injury from but winds, which in some districts are considerable. FROST IN THE GRAIN BELT

Pit Prices Strong Except During Period of Liquidating by a Prominent Long -- Closes

CHICAGO, Aug. 16.—Prediction of frosts for South Dakota, Northern Nebraska and the British Northwest helped cause firmness in wheat today. It had a bullish undertone, influenced by reiteration of unfavorable crop news from Russia, by similar reports from France and by bread riots in the south of Spain. Damage from locusts in Argentina became a factor in the attuation later and gave next to a buying movement that began soon after the opening. September started ice off to ice up at \$15,0515c and was bid up to 824c. A large time sold out by brokers sup-posedly operating for a prominent long, checked the upward trend and caused a loss of some of the advance, though the general sentiment remained unchanged.
