# NEW LINE AND QUICK FERRY Fifth and Washington Streets

Consolidated Will Build Road Immediately to Shaw's Island.

SERVICE TO VANCOUVER

By Means of Bridge and Trestle and Island, Terminal Time Will Be Shortened to Half an Hour.

Specifications will be completed in a few days ready for beginning actual work on construction of the new line of the Portland Consolidated Railway Company from the north end of Union evenue to a point a few hundred feet west of the east end of Shaw's Island, where the new ferry landing for the Oregon side of the Columbia is to be constructed. When completed a 30-minute service to Vancouver can be mainsined as easily as a 45-minute service at present.

The improvement has been in contemplation for some time previous to the sale of the property to the Seligman and Clark Interests, and the estimated cost is \$100,000. George L. Estabrook. of Philadelpnia, and M. S. Hopkins, of Columbus, O., representing the new owners, who have been making a thorough examination of the property and investigation of conditions for the purpose of formulating policies and de termining upon improvements that should be authorized, decided that this construction should be completed without delay. Mr. Estabrook last evening authorized the official announcement that the line would be completed this

#### Right of Way Arranged.


