And the close affinity between the McBride element that centers about ex-Senator George W. Mc-Bride, Judge Mcliride's brother, and the Matthews muchine of Portland, is understood to have contributed to the delay in Judge McBride's appointment. Further more, the Fresident has said that he de sires to appoint a "young" man-say, be tween 60 and 50 years.
