MUD ON PAVEMENTS I

Careless Teamsters Get Into Trouble as Result.

JAMES RILEY IS ARRESTED

Municipal Court Hears His Defense and the Testimony of the Policeman Who Arrested Him. Other Cases Come Up.

In the spatiering rain, Municipal Judge Cameron viewed the pavements on Holla-day, Adams and Pacinc streets yesterday afternoon, and it is probable that he will deliver some remarks from the bench this merning that will strike terror to careless teamsters and negligent contractors who permit literally barrelfuls of earth to drop from wagons and ite on the costly improved thoroughfares, to ruin the work that has been done and paid for by tax-

Judge Cameron declined to make any advance statements concerning the con-dition of the streets, but others who saw them declare that mud from one to four inches thick lies on the wooden block pavements of Holladay, Pacific and Adms streets. Judge Cameron must have

witnessed the same thing.

The case of the city against James Riley,
who has been before the court two previous times, was what caused Judge Camerun to view the premises and satisfy
himself in what condition teamsters and contractors leave streets. Riley was charged by Mounted Policeman Croxford with permitting earth to lie on the pavements of Holinday, Pacific and Adams streets. He pleased not guilty, and said that he left the streets in better condi-tion than when he began the work of tauling away earth from an excavation

Pollerman Croxford, however, had his evidence well in hand. He knew all about the case from start to finish, as he had noted former violations of this very important city ordinance, and purposed to keep a strict watch on Riley to see that he was obliged to obey the law. Croxhe was obliged to obey the law. Crox-ford testified positively that Riley's em-ployes did not clean up the streets; that they left much earth on the pavements and that yesterday morning, because of the rain, mud was all over the streets. Judge Cameron, having had several cases similar to this one, took occasion last week to view conditions on Sixth and Oak, and Seventh and Morrison streets. He remarked yesterday that he watched teamysters for ten minutes at

satched teamsters for ten minutes at each place, and never saw one of them clean off the wheels of wagon or attempt

to keep earth from the streets.

A. H. Tanner appeared in defense of Ruley. He was of the opinion that the ordinance, if enforced to the strict letter. would work a hardship upon teamsters and contractors, but Deputy City Attor-ncy Fitzgerald replied by declaring that teamsters and contractors were altogether top careless; that they have no regard for the rights of others, and that they cared pot how many pavements they rulned, as they did not have to pay for the im-provements. The ordinance is very important, he said, because it was the only means within the power of the city whereby pavements may be kept in good
