New Cable Will Be Extended to Japan and China.

FINAL AGREEMENTS MADE

Mackay System Will Lay Wires to Yokohama and Shanghai From Guam and Manila—Begin Work at Once.

NEW YORK, Sept. 14.—Through American enterprise, the way has been won to connect the Western continent by direct submarine telegraphic lines with the Eastern.

Yesterday the last step in a series of diplomatic negotiations, which were begun at the wish of President McKinley, and which have extended over a period of about three years, was taken.

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MARKET IS LOADED

Vast Quantities of American Goods in Shanghai.

BOYCOTT STOPS SALES

Financial Crisis Feared as Result, and Chinese Will Suffer First.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14.—(Special.)—The seriousness of the boycott situation in China proper is the subject of a report to the Department of State by Mr. St. Paul's Institute at Tientsin.

"One phase of the boycott movement which is disturbing all business minds is the effect it is likely to produce upon the finances of this great center of commerce.

There are at the present time in Shanghai warehouses 100,000 bales of American piece goods, valued at nearly \$3,000,000 in gold.

The question of marketing this commodity and of collecting the money therefore under present conditions, and with Manchuria closed, presents a serious condition, and is apt to create great difficulties.

"What is true of piece goods is also true of all other lines of staple products. The markets have been overstocked, and now nothing is moving, and the Chinese merchants are suffering.

The State Department has been informed that the Japanese government has removed the restrictions on river shipments to the interior of Manchuria, and that large quantities of American goods are being sent forward.

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DISPERSAL OF CONVENTION

STIRS UP INDIGNATION. Threats to Blow Up Governor—More Rifles Found on Sunken Fighting Steamer.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 14.—The breaking up of a meeting of 900 delegates from all towns in Finland, called for the purpose of discussing the political situation has aroused great indignation throughout Finland.

The action of the government in dispersing the gathering has fanned the discontent felt by the Finnish people, which today even went so far as to bring forth threats to throw a bomb at the Governor-General.

The dispersal of the last battalion of the Russian authorities has proved to be unpopular, and since the dispersal of the meeting of the delegates yesterday this has been taken up as an additional grievance against Russia.

Helsingfors, Finland, Sept. 14.—The steamer, which was sunk by the crew September 10, after landing a portion of her cargo of arms and ammunition on a barren island in the Gulf of Bothnia, has been positively identified as the John Gratton, of London, Eng., of 500 tons.
