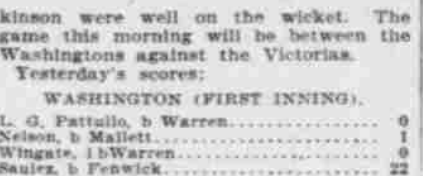

RAILWAY FILES ARTICLES

NORTHERN PACIFIC AND GREAT NORTHERN INTERESTED. Both Roads Will Come Into Portland From Spokane by the North Bank.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Sept. 15.—(Special.)—The Portland & Seattle Railway Company, whose operations along the Columbia River have given evidence of the intention of the Northern Pacific at once to construct its lines down the north bank of the river, has filed its articles of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State. While the articles were entered of record today, they bear the filing mark of August 21. This is at the request of the incorporators, who submitted the articles on the date named. The papers had been returned for correction, and were received back in proper shape today.
