MACHINERY MAY GO FREE

American Publisher Discusses Effect of Congressmen's Visit—Japan

Will Expand to the Astonishment of the World.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—William J. Johnston, of New York, publisher of the American Exporter, who, as a member of Secretary Taft's party, made the trip to the Orient to investigate commercial conditions and the opportunities for extending the sale of American manufactures in the Philippines, Japan and China, today said that in his opinion the visit of the Congressional delegation would be of much good to American trade in the Far East. He said: The Congressmen did conscientious and intelligent work in the islands and made an excellent impression. Not only upon the natives but upon business men.

As to the effect upon American trade in the Orient of the commercial expansion of Japan after the war, Mr. Johnston said:

I believe that during the next ten years Japan will attack the world as much in the developing of her manufacturing and commerce as she has surprised it in the last ten years by the expansion of her military and naval power. Whatever this may signify to the world in general and to America ultimately, I am not at all prepared to say. But for the next 20 years and more it indicates a great increase in our Oriental trade. It will most likely bring many changes and in some lines may spell disaster, but on the whole we cannot fail to be benefited by the internal expansion and development of China, Corea and Japan.

Taft Makes Trip to Sacramento.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—Secretary Taft and a few members of his party left here today for a trip up the Sacramento River as the guests of the reclamation committee. The Secretary will examine into the site of the drawbridge proposed by the Southern Pacific and he will also make an examination of the reclamation work that is being done along the river.

TAFT STARTS FOR WASHINGTON

Will Make Record Trip Across Pacific and America.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.—Secretary of War Taft and party left tonight by special train, consisting of a baggage-car containing trophies in the way of curios collected by the party, a diner, two sleepers and the special car Colonia. The train will run on Overland Limited time through to Chicago, over the Southern Pacific, Union Pacific and Chicago & Northwestern, arriving in Chicago on Sunday evening. Mr. Taft will leave there immediately over the Baltimore & Ohio road, and arrive in Washington on Monday evening, thus making a record run from the Orient to Washington in 24 days and 11 hours.

MORE LAND FOR PEASANTS

ZEMSTVOISITS OPPOSE BUYING OUT LANDLORDS.

Radical Scheme Rejected by Congress—Sympathy With Liberal Leaders Angers Governor.

MOSCOW, Sept. 28.—The Congress of Zemstvo and municipalities today discussed its economic programme with special reference to the peasants' need of more land. The committee submitted the draft of a proposed appeal to the legis-

lature, in which was advanced the right of the state to expropriate the land of its owners and divide it among peasants who were without land. The executive committee of the congress opposed the draft, and especially the section relating to the expropriation of land, and in the final draft merely urged the necessity of increasing the allotment of land and reforms in connection with land tenure. The final draft also urged the adoption of measures for popular education and for the establishment of state insurance for workmen.

It was proposed that the congress should send telegrams of sympathy to Prince Lvoff (a marshal of the nobility and one of the delegates who presented the petition of the last all-Russian Zemstvo Congress to the Emperor), who was attacked during the recent disturbances at Bala-shoff, and to M. Kerobenko, who was expelled from Odessa at the time of the mutiny on the battleship Konia Potemkin. The representative of General Durnovo, governor general of Moscow, who has attended all the sessions of the congress, threatened to stop the proceedings if the conditions under which the delegates were permitted to assemble were violated, protesting against the proposal, contending that it was not included in the programme of the congress. The delegates listened in silence to the protest.

PEACE RESTORED AT BAKU

Oil Men Refuse to Work Until Protection is Assured.

BAKU, Caucasus, Sept. 28.—With the formal ratification of peace between the Tatars and Armenians here, the order confining the inhabitants to their houses after 5 in the evening has been revoked and street traffic and the ordinary course of life are being resumed. Masses of Armenians and Tatars are thronging the cathedral and mosques and joining in processions to celebrate their reconciliation. An investigation of the damage done established the fact that two-fifths of the derricks in the oil fields have not been destroyed, the owners reporting that 1,500 out of 2,412 derricks were burned. When the 2,412 derricks were active the daily output was 17,500 tons. The oil men decline to resume pumping from the remaining wells or engage in the work of reconstruction until the completion of the naphtha conference at St. Petersburg, in which, at the request of the owners' representatives, the workmen will participate. In anticipation, however, that the government will grant reforms guaranteeing the safety of life and property in the future, the oil men are placing large orders for machinery and material.

OPEN DOORS WIDE TO JEWS

University Professors Favor Removing Restrictions on Education.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28.—The Council of Professors has voted in favor of the unrestricted admission of Jews to the university courses and has recommended the admission of all candidates for matriculation regardless of the regulation restricting Hebrew students to 3 per cent of the student body. The rector of the university promised to give his hearty support to the recommendation.

NOBILITY VOTES FOR REFORM

Resolutions in St. Petersburg Favor Liberal Policy.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28.—The nobility of St. Petersburg at a special meeting have adopted eight resolutions without discussion, all of a liberal reform character. The most important follow: That the legislative, judicial and executive branches should be separated from each other and that equal justice be rendered to everybody. That the clergy be better trained and cared for and clerical appointments be effected selectively. That the various ministries work in co-operation and that ministers be held responsible for their acts. That measures be taken to overcome the illiteracy of the masses and that freedom to establish schools be granted everybody. That freedom of assembly, organization and the press be assured. That roads and other means of communication be improved and extended.

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SIBERIA TO BE REPRESENTED

Commission Allots Delegates on Basis of Property.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28.—The inclusion of Siberia in the First National Assembly is assured, the Solokoy Commission having determined on the allotment of 15 Siberian members, of which number one will represent the City of Irkutsk. The members will not be elected on class basis. The franchise is bestowed on owners of 500 to 1000 acres of land, depending on the fertility, or on the proprietors of urban property of similar value.

Autoist Must Be Tried for Killing.

CLEVELAND, O., Sept. 28.—Mrs. Edith M. Bailey, wife of a wealthy manufacturer, beneath whose automobile Joseph Broertle was fatally injured, was bound over to the grand jury on the charge of manslaughter.
