Free Admission of Philippine Products Likely.

MACHINERY MAY GO FREE

American Publisher Discusses Effect of Congressmen's Visit-Japan Will Expand to the Astonisliment of the World.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 28.-William J. Johnston, of New York, publisher of the American Exporter, who, as a member of Secretary Taft's party, made the trip to the Orient to investigate commercial con ditions and the opportunities for extend-ing the sale of American manufactures in the Philippines, Japan and China, to-day sait that in his opinion the visit of the Congrussional delegation would be of much good to American trade in the Far East, He said:

The Congressmen did conscientious and intelligent work in tr. leiands and made an excellent impression, Lot only upon the natives but upon bushess men.

While one cannot always accurately foresent the action of Congress, the indications are that Philippine sugar and tobacto will be admitted into the United States free of daty, as hemp new is. If so, Congress will probably think that as a matter of reciprocity American machinery and appliances for developing the industries of the islands should go into the Philippines free. In case, however, that goods from this country shall not be admitted free at once, on the ground that the resenues will be asked for a time in meet the expenses of the insular government there is little doubt that at the latest this will come at the time that the agreement with Spain as a equal tariff privileges in the Philippines shall expire in about three pears.

As to the effect upon American trade in Orient of the commercial expansion of Japan after the war, Mr. Johnston

said:

I believe that during the next ten years Japan will astonish the world as much in the development of her manufacturing and commerce as she has surprised it in the last ten years by the expansion of her military and naval powers. Whatever this may signify to the world in general and to America diltimately. I am not atte to prophesy but for the next 20 years and more it indicates a great increase in our Oriental trade. It will most likely bring many changes and in some lines may spell disaster, but on the whole we cannot fail to be benefied by the litternal expansions and developments of China. Corea and Japan.

#### MORE LAND FOR PEASANTS

ZEMSTVOISTS OPPOSE BUYING OUT LANDLORDS.

Radical Scheme Rejected by Congress. Sympathy With Liberal Leaders Angers Governor.

MOSCOW, Sept. 28.-The Congress of Zemstvoe and municipalities today dis-cussed its economic programme with special reference to the peasants' need of firaft of a proposed appeal to the

lature, in which was advanced the right of the state to exprepriate the land of its owners and divide it among pessants who

vere without land.
The executive committee of the con gress opposed the draft, and especially the section relating to the expropriation of land, and in the final draft merely urged the necessity of increasing the allotment of land and of reforms in connection with land tenure. The final draft also urged the adoption of measures for popular education and for the establishment of state

nsurance for workingmen. It was proposed that the congress should end telegrams of sympathy to Prince woff (a marshal of the nobility and one

of the delegates who presented the peti-tion of the last all-Russian Zemstvo Congress to the Emperer), who was attacked during the recent disturbances at Bala-shoff, and to M. Zerobenko, who was expelled from Odessa at the time of the mutiny on the battleship Kniaz Potemkin. The representative of General Durnovo, governor general of Moscow, who has at-tended all the sessions of the congress, threatened to stop the proceedings if the conditions under which the delegates were permitted to assemble were violated, protested against the proposal, contending that it was not included in the programme of the congress. PEACE RESTORED AT BAKE

Oil Men Refuse to Work Until Protection Is Assured.

BAKU, Caucasia, Sept. 28.-With the formal ratification of peace between the Tatars and Armenians here, the order confining the inhabitants to their houses after 8 in the evening has been revoked and street traffic and the ordinary course of life are being resumed. Masses of Ar-mentans and Tatars are thronging the cathedral and mosques and joining in processions to celebrate their reconcilia-

An investigation of the damage done stablished the fact that two-fifths of the derricks in the oil fields have not been estroyed, the owners reporting that 1,996 out of 5,412 derricks were burned. When the 2.412 detricks were active the daily output was 17,500 tons.

The oil men decline to resume pumping from the remaining wells or engage in the work of reconstruction until the conclu-sion of the naphtha conference at St. Petersburg, in which, at the request of the owners' representatives, the workmen will participate. In anticipation, however, that the government will grant reforms guaranteeing the safety of life and prop-erry in the future, the oil men are placing large orders for machinery and mate-

OPEN DOORS WIDE TO JEWS

University Professors Favor Remov-

ing Restrictions on Education. ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28 .- The Counciu of Professors has voted in favor of the unrestricted admission of Jews to the university courses and has recommended the admission of all candidates for mat-riculation regardless of the regulation restricting Hebrew students to 3 per cent of the student body. The rector of the university promised to give his hearty support to the recommendation.

NOBILITY VOTES FOR REFORM

Resolutions in St. Petersburg Favor Liberal Policy.

ST. PETERSBURG, Sept. 28.-The nobility of St. Petersburg at a special meeting have adopted eight resolutions without dissension, all of a Liberal reform character. The most important follow:

That the legislative, judicial and executive branches should be separated from each

other and that equal justice be rendered to That the clergy be better trained and cared for and clerical appointments be effected

electively.

That the various ministers work in cooperation and that ministers he held responsible for their acts.

That measures be taken to overcome the
illiteracy of the masses and that freedom
to establish schools be granted everybody.

That freedom of assembly, organization
and the press he assured.

That roads and other means of communication be improved and extended.
