

UNBROKEN TRAINS

Rear-End Collision on O. R. & N. Ties Up Road for Eight Hours.

ALMOST IN YARD LIMITS

Violation of Rules Causes Destruction of Cars, Injury of Locomotives and Prolonged Delay to Passengers.

WARSHIP IN DANGER.

A Mass of Wreckage.

The wreck occurred on the main line about 200 yards below the Burnside-street bridge at the foot of Sullivan's Gulch. It filled the right of way for 50 yards with a tangled mass of wreckage which required eight hours' hard work to clear away sufficiently to permit the passage of trains.

Locomotives Badly Damaged.

The impetus of the 35 cars behind the two engines crashed the tender of the second engine, the cars stripping the rear end of the boiler and piling the cars following on top of one another with the tender beneath. In all, eight cars and the caboose of the second train were demolished, the cargoes scattered over the ground and in the slough and both engines damaged.

Six Steamers Are Unable to Pull It Off.

ASTORIA, Oct. 1.—(Special.)—The big log raft which drifted onto the sands below the entrance to Young's Bay a few days ago is still hard aground. This afternoon six steamers, comprising the Leggett, the steam schooner Aberdeen, the stern-wheeler Oklahama and Harvest Queen and two of the Callender Navigation Company's boats, pulled on the raft for an hour, but were unable to float it. They succeeded, however, in swinging the raft, and moved it about 40 feet ahead.

ASSESSED VALUES

TREBLE '04 LIST

Assessor Sigler Bases Estimate on Actual Market Values of Realty.

Portland real property, according to the estimate of Assessor D. B. Sigler, is worth for purposes of taxation \$147,758,377, as against an assessment of \$56,422,577 in 1904. At this assessment, allowing for reductions that may be made by the County Board of Equalization, which meets today for a week's session, it is estimated by Mr. Sigler that the tax levied for 1905 need not exceed a maximum of 16 mills, as against the 40-mill levy of 1904.

TAX RATE TO BE FAR LOWER

Compares Assessment Totals of Last Year With Those Just Fixed by Him—Levy on Personal Property.

Increase on Franchises.

Franchises have been assessed at a much higher figure than ever before, and in this, too, the Assessor has attempted to fix the valuation by the real value of the property. It is realized that the value of franchises in large measure is indeterminate, and must be placed with a view to business conditions and volume of trade. This theory has been followed by Mr. Sigler in the assessment of franchises which are liable to taxes in the city.
