President Cannot Intercede for Russian Jews.

WITTE ADMITS IMPOTENCE

Urgent Appeals From Leaders of Race in America Draw Forth Reply That Roosevelt Cannot Help Their Brethren.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6.—President Roosevelt has decided that no action can be taken by this Government at present which will be of any benefit to the people of Russia.

Horrified but Helpless.

"The government is horrified at these outrages. You know that I do not sympathize with such savage outbreaks. All I can do to stop the persecution of the Jews in this country is to urge the local authorities to exert power."

Nothing Can Be Done.

Mr. Ades indicated clearly that the situation in Russia is such that it appeared hopeless to expect any good to result from intervention by this Government, which expression agreed with Mr. Wolff's own opinion set out in his letter to Rabbi Leventhal. The latter says in part:
