Southern States Want Congress to Legislate on Quarantine.

CHATTANOOGA, Tenn., Nov. Fourteen states today, through their rep-resentatives, resolved to request Congress to enset a law whereby coast, maritime to enset a law wherehy coast, maritime and national frontier quarantine shall be placed exclusively under the control and jurisdiction of the United States Govern-ment, and that matters of interstate quarantine shall be placed under the con-trol and jurisdiction of the United States Government, acting in co-operation with the several State Boards of Health. It was also decided to request Congress to make sufficient appropriation to carry on the service and to exterminate the yel-low fever mosquito in this country, be-sides arranging with other American gov-ernments to kill off the mosquito.
