THROUGHOUT THE DAY.

Liquidating Sales by Commission-Houses and Shorts-Large Shipments From Argentina.

CHICAGO, Dec. 22.—Weakness in the wheat market developed within the first few minutes of trading and continued until the close of the session. Liquidating sales by commission houses, supplemented by aggressive short setting on the part of local bears, caused declines ranging from 15 to 1%c. The greatest pressure was on the December option. This was done to the increasing local stocks, which it was said might compel longs to take large quantities of cash grain on December contracts. Shipments from Argentina for the week were larger than the estimates, and primary receipts were unexpectedly heavy. During the day the market lacked positive support and the feeling was heavy until the close. May opened unchanged from SPAGST4c, sold off to 87c and closed off %c at \$18874c.
