CHINESE BOYCOTT SEVERELY FELT ON PUGET SOUND.

Few Orders are Received From the Orient and One Big Plant is Already Idle.

TACOMA, Wash., Jan. 9.—(Special.)—Instead of waiting, as has been frequently reported, the Chinese boycott is becoming stronger, and it orders are not soon received from the Orient...

The Tacoma Grain Company's plant, having a capacity of 2000 barrels a day, is idle, while the mill of the Puget Sound Flouring Mills Company, with capacity of 1800 barrels, is grinding to supply the local trade...

These three mills depend on the export trade. Less than 8 per cent of their output is consumed at home. The Siberian market is pretty well supplied with flour, a number of cargoes being on the way there now, and as Japan is not buying as heavily as at the close of the war, China is the only large consumer left.
