Asked whether or not Hermann would evade trial in March and seek a post-ponement until the adjournment of Congress, as is wholly within his legal right, Gatley had nothing to say. He would not venture to speak on this question for its client, and, as Mr. Hermann is still denying himself to all callers, he could no speak for himself.

It had been intended to arrange the Hermann case for bearing on February 15 or thereabouts, but the last week in March has subsequently been agreed upon, as it will give Hermann and Gatley ample time to recover from their jate illness and afford them every

opportunity to prepare for trial,

If at some subsequent time Hermann

plan arranged today will have to be abandoned and the trial postponed probably until next June.

RICH BOUNTY FOR WAR HEROES

Japan Will Raise New Loan and Give Them \$75,000,000.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9 .- Japan is to make grants aggregating \$75,900,000 to bonds is recognition of the services rendered dur-ing the war with Russia. This statemen is made by Korekiro Takahishi, special commissioner of the Japanese Govern-ment. The grants are contained in a new issue of bonds estimated at \$215,000.00, designed to assist in meeting the expense of the war with Russia. Of the remainde of the issue, which is to be made entirely at home, \$100,000,000 will be raised in the market and \$40,000,000 is to be taken up by the Government's Savings Deposit Bu renu. Mr. Takahishi said:

The expenditures resulting from the way are estimated at \$400,000,000, and are to be seet by the revenues from the war taxes and by other resources, which consist of the pr eccis of loans strendy issued, the sale of the booty and other disused articles and a new loan. The pew terms is to be made entirely at home, and its requisite amount is seci-mated at \$215.000,000. Of this total \$800, 000,000 will be taised in the market, which is not likely to red a pressure of this amount because in the course of a year the Government is to redeem exchanger bunds for the benefit of the market. Of the remainder of the new issue \$75,000,000 is to be delivered
