# BILL GOES THROUGH

House Passes Statehood Amid Many Protests.

#### CREATES TWO NEW STARS

Western Men Condemn to Last Union of New Mexico and Arizona. Hepburn Recalls Incidents of History.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 33.-The House passed the statehood bill according to chedule today. The Republican opposition spent its entire force yesterday and no effort was made to defeat the bill on its final passage, only 33 of the "insurgents" voting against it. The bill passes by the vote of 194 to 150. The debute which preceded this vote began at II o'clock and was practically featureless so far as any hope was entertained of changing the measure in the slightest

The bill as passed provides that Okla-homa and the Indian Territory shall con-situte one state under the name of Oklahoma, and that Arizona and New Mexico shall constitute a state under the name Arizona. Should the terms of admission be ratified by the residents of the two former territories, their respective state constitutions must contain clauses prohibiting the sale of intoxicating liquors and plural marriages. The constitution of Arizona must prohibit the sale of liquor to Indians forever and that of Oklahoma for 21 years. There are many other stipulations concerning schools, courts and political subdivisions of the proposed new states.

GREEK FIREMAN MAKES GAL-LANT FIGHT IN SURF.

Driven Back by Waves, He Dragged Upon the Wreck, Stunned by Shock.

VICTORIA, B. C., Jan. 35.-The tug Lorne, which returned at midnight from the wreck of the Valencia, brought John Segalos, of San Francisco, a fireman of the Valencia, rescued by the City of Topeka from a raft and placed on board the tug Lorne. Segalos is a Greek. In the interview he told of a futile attempt made by him to swim ashore, carrying a line through the seething breakers, to attach the line between the wreck and shore, and of how he and 17 other survivors had spent from 10 A. M. until 4 P. M. of Wednesday on a fragile raft, buffeted by the gale and swept by the running seas until picked up by the Toneka. He said:

"It was my turn on watch in the fireroom when, at 11:50 P. M., Monday night, the Valencia, going very slow, suddenly struck the rocks and shook from end to end. Orders came to the engineer to reverse. The boat backed from the rocks, and soon afterward the water came rushing in at a rate of about a foot a minute, and we all knew the steamer was doomed.

'The officers and crew passed out lifebelts to everybody and orders were given to man the boats. It was terrible, the darkness, the rain, the crashing of the wreck and the roar of the boiling surf. Panic seized many and there was a blind rush in the blackness to get in the boats. At about 12:30 I saw a boat loaded with 25 people crash the sea. 
