

FLIBUSTERING FOR EIGHT HOURS

Democrats Resist Provision for Long Hours for Canal Coolies.

CLARK WANTS NO CHINESE

House Adopts Shonts' Recommendation on Labor Question—Struggle Will Be Renewed Today.

Setback for Wilson.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The first attempt at filibustering during this session occurred in the House today in a Democratic effort to defeat the provision of the eight-hour law for foreign laborers on the Panama Canal. The amendment was placed in the bill in committee of the whole after the House had divided many times on every pretext which Williams could make the cause for a vote. When the bill was finally finished, late in the day, a demand for a separate vote and roll-call on that amendment was made and ordered, at which time the House adjourned. The vote will occur tomorrow. The amendment was ruled out of the bill on a point of order on Tuesday, and its insertion today was effected under the provisions of a special rule brought from the rules committee for the purpose. The only other controversy of the day resulted from an attempt to increase by \$15.00 the amount for meat inspection by the Department of Agriculture. This increase was refused after an animated debate.

All Coolies Alike to Clark.

After half a dozen attempts to obtain a roll-call on various motions had failed, the House went into committee of the whole and the eight-hour amendment was at once offered under the rule. Clark of Missouri gave notice that he should immediately prepare a bill extending the Chinese exclusion act to the last of Panama, "and I will make it extend to Japanese coolies, too," he declared, "because all coolies look alike to me, and I will make you get out into the open if you intend to dig that canal with Chinamen."

Every possible point in the progress of the amendment was fought, but it was finally adopted, 83 to 35. Clark offered a Chinese exclusion amendment according to his announcement, and before it went out on a point of order he read remarks of Chairman Shonts, of the Canal Commission, saying it was a mistake to hamper the construction of the canal with the eight-hour law, the contract-labor laws or any other but police and sanitary laws.

No More for Meat Inspection.

A seeming controversy between the Secretary of Agriculture and Congress on the question of meat inspection developed an hour of spirited debate and resulted in the defeat of several attempts to increase the deficiency appropriation of \$20,000 carried by the bill for that purpose. It was first sought to add \$15,000 to the fund, and when that failed, \$20,000 more was suggested, but that also failed. Tawney characterized the bill as "another illustration of the attempt to increase the deficiency appropriation beyond that which was provided in the regular appropriation bill."

The bill was finished under the five-minute rule at 5:20 o'clock. For the Democrats, Clark of Missouri demanded a roll-call on the eight-hour waiver for the canal, and pending this, Latta moved an adjournment. This motion was contested and had to be put twice with a division of the House before it was declared carried ten minutes later.

The vote on the eight-hour amendment will be taken up the first thing tomorrow, after which the bill will be put on its passage.

WILL REPORT STATEHOOD BILL

Senate Committee Acts After Making Few Small Changes.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The Senate committee on territories today authorized a favorable report on the joint statehood bill passed by the House yesterday, and Senator Beveridge, chairman of the committee, said later he would present the report in the Senate next Monday. None of the Democratic members were present when the agreement to take a vote was reached. Patterson and Chandler were in attendance earlier in the day, but they concluded not to make any attempt to delay the report or to force a division on any of the disputed points. They reserved the right to present a minority report.

The bill was amended in several places, but the amendments related largely to the governmental machinery provided by the measure, such as the judiciary, the methods of voting, etc. It is the purpose to press the bill upon the attention of the Senate as soon as possible.

WILL NOT SELL PHILIPPINES

Taft Denies Rumor Which Causes Unrest Among Natives.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The following cablegram has been received by the Secretary of War from General Ide, at Manila:

"Natives much disturbed by cable statement that Ambassador Wright has been authorized to negotiate sale of islands to Japan. Authentic denial from you would be useful."

Secretary Taft replied to the cablegram as follows:

"The cable statement referred to in your cablegram has not the slightest vestige of truth. It is not only untrue, but absurdly so."

Forbid Gambling in Territories.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—The House committee on judiciary today decided to report favorably on the Littlefield bill to prohibit gambling in territories of the United States. The bill is so worded that its provisions, in the opinion of the committee, will apply only to the organized territories, namely, New Mexico, Arizona, Oklahoma and Indian Territory.

Slaughter Roll of Railroads.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—A bulletin issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission today shows that during the months of July, August and September last, 300 were killed and 3,536 injured among passengers and employees of steam railroads in the United States.

Wright Tells About Philippines.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—Governor General Luke E. Wright, of the Philippine Islands, testified today before the Senate committee having charge of the pending Philippine tariff bill. He talked at length concerning agricultural conditions in the islands.

PUSH AMERICA'S CLAIMS

COMMITTEE WHICH WILL TURN TIDE OF TOURISTS.

Propaganda of American Sight-Seeing Started at Salt Lake—Meetings in Each City.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Jan. 26.—In charge of the propaganda for increasing the popularity of American sightseeing tours will be during the coming year: Robert L. McCormick, Tacoma, Wash.; ex-Governor David R. Francis, Missouri; T. B. Walker, Minneapolis; David Starr Jordan, Stanford University; Irving Howbert, Colorado Springs; and Nathan C. Shaffer, president of the National Educational Association, Haverbury, Pa.

The gentlemen named comprise the executive committee chosen by the "See America First" conference here today. Fisher Harris, of the Salt Lake Commercial Club, was named as permanent secretary. Temporary headquarters will be maintained in Salt Lake until the executive committee shall select a permanent location. Every delegate was pledged to arrange, on his return home, a public meeting in furtherance of the plans of the conference. Tonight an elaborate banquet was served at the Commercial Club. Ways and means to provide financial support for the movement will be considered at an executive session to be held tomorrow morning.

At the session today Delegate Booth, of Boise, Idaho, offered a resolution that it should be the sense of the conference that the railroads should give free side trips to points of interest to holders of through tickets. This aroused the criticism of the railroad men and others, and was finally withdrawn.

eral times since his return to the Army, once or twice at Tampa. I do not know of any man who showed greater pleasure in entering the United States service than he did in Tampa when he put on again for the Spanish campaign the old blue uniform of the United States. Once, when I was introducing him to a large audience at Carnegie Hall gathered in the interest of the Y. M. C. A. I remarked that he used to bother me more than any other commander that I knew of

when I had a force in the West in 1884 and 1885. As soon as he could get on his feet he remarked with a pleasant smile that he wished General Howard would forget a little more of that ancient history.

"His marked characteristics were kindness, courtesy, the very beautiful ideal of gentility and the extraordinary devotion to duty as he saw it. His Christian sentiments were never obtruded upon strangers, but he was pronounced and outspoken as a Chris-

tian whenever the occasion demanded it. It was always a delight to meet him and talk with him upon any topic connected with the public interests, but more especially did he shine in private life."

When General Stewart L. Woodford rose to make an address at the dinner of the second panel of the Sheriff's jury last night at Delmonico's, word of the death of General Wheeler had not reached the diners, and one of the features of the function was the glow-

ing eulogy passed on the ex-Confederate leader by General Woodford, who
