

WRECKED AT DELTA

Oregon Express Runs Into a Landslide on Track.

THE ENGINEER IS KILLED

Second Fall of Earth From the Hillside Sweeps Down Upon the Broken Engines and Wrecked Cars.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., Feb. 20.—About 9 o'clock this evening the south-bound Oregon Express No. 15, due to arrive in this city at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning, ran into a landslide half a mile above the town of Delta.

According to meager dispatches here, the two engines attached to the train were derailed to scrapiron. Two malfeasants were reduced to rubble, the engine tank rolled into the ditch alongside the track, and the baggage car stopped on a ledge of the embankment.

After the cars had piled up, and while the crew was working among the wreckage, a second landslide came sweeping down the side of the hill, partly burying a portion of the wreck.

Engineer D. Freil, of Dunsmuir, was in the track of the slide, and was buried in the midst of the wreckage. When taken out he was dead. He was one of the oldest engineers in the service of the Southern Pacific in this part of the state.

A wrecking-train and crew left this city for the scene of the wreck at 11:45 tonight, and it is estimated that the track will be blocked for 18 hours more.

ROBBED THE SMELTER

EVERETT EMPLOYEE CAUGHT WITH BRICK OF BULLION.

William Meisl Confesses That His Peculations Have Been Going on for a Year.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 20.—William Meisl, an employee of the Everett Smelting Company, of Everett, was arrested tonight on a charge of having robbed his company during the past few months of at least \$10,000 worth of gold and silver bullion. When arrested Meisl had in his possession a check for \$28,54, which he had received from a local jewelry company, to whom he had sold some of the metal, and in one of his pockets was found a brick of the bullion weighing six pounds.

It is pronounced by an assayer to be valued at \$10 an ounce. Meisl admitted that since early last spring he has been systematically robbing the smelter company, and that at this time he has 15 of the bricks hid under the floor of his house in Everett.

DR. HYDE IS COMING.

Irish Scholar Experts to Be in Portland in March.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 20.—Dr. Douglas Hyde will visit Portland about the last week in March. From Portland he will go to Seattle, from there to Butte, and thence to Denver. Dr. Hyde will remain in San Francisco until after March 11. The statement was made at his local headquarters this morning that all arrangements for his stay in Portland would be left to the Portland committee.

It is now assured that Dr. Douglas Hyde, the famous Irish scholar, will come to Portland and deliver an address on the subject of Gaelic literature, although he will be unable to appear here upon the date suggested by the local committee. Those who are interested in the Gaelic language are rejoicing over their good fortune in securing an engagement with Dr. Hyde, as he is regarded as one of the most eminent scholars of that tongue.

A subscription list to raise money to defray the expenses of Dr. Hyde's visit is now being circulated. The committee in charge of the matter is composed of Judge M. G. Munly, Joseph M. Healy, P. E. Sullivan, Dan McAllen and Professor Lambert Morrison.

"Shamrock" Sent to Penitentiary.

SPOKANE, Wash., Feb. 20.—Judge Huene today sentenced James Hardy, generally known as "Shamrock," to 20 years in the penitentiary, for holding up and robbing a saloon at Ellensburg, in which escaped two men were seriously wounded by shots from a revolver. William Lang, a colored man, received five years at hard labor for attempted burglary. Lewis Owens received one year for stealing a suit of clothes, and James Turner, a colored man, was sentenced to one year in jail and fined \$50 for stealing an overcoat.

Rain May Check Epidemic.

EUGENE, Or., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—Heavy rain fell here all last night and up to noon today, and a strong belief prevails that it has been of much benefit to health, and that the fever, much of which is undoubtedly malarial, will be much easier to control.

Physicians are strongly of the opinion that the worst has been passed, and that new cases in future will be few, and that within a week the epidemic will be absolutely under control.

Exploding Lamp Starts Fire.

HARRISBURG, Or., Feb. 20.—The home of George E. McCulloch, in this city, was burned to the ground, Sunday evening, with all its contents. Mr. McCulloch and family barely escaped with their lives. The fire started by the explosion of a coal-oil lamp, and in attempting to smother the flames, Mr. McCulloch had both hands badly burned.

Farmers Begin Plowing.

LA GRANDE, Or., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—Many valley farmers have commenced plowing. There is scarcely any frost in the ground, and the only thing that interferes with Spring work is the rain and the damp condition of the ground in some localities.

Opposition to Templeman.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 20.—At a meeting of the Conservative Association, held tonight, it was decided to bring out a candidate to oppose the Hon. William Templeman, Minister of Inland Revenue, at the forthcoming election in March.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—In the basketball game between Portland and the Tacoma Y. M. C. A., Portland led all through the first half. Because Referee Mackie did not award Tacoma a point on a foul which he did not see or call, Booth, the physical director, who umpired, called his team off the floor and the game was awarded to Portland, 2 to 0. Monday night Portland defeated Winlock, 27 to 17.

Russell to Be Sole Defendant.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—It has been arranged by the attorneys in the case to try the case of the State of Washington vs. Bruce & Russell, in which fraud is alleged in certain tide-land leases in Pacific County, in the Thurston County Court. The proceedings will be dismissed as to Bruce and C. B. Russell will be made sole defendant.

News-Herald Plant Is Sold.

ASTORIA, Or., Feb. 20.—(Special.)—The plant of the Astoria News-Herald was sold by Sheriff Lavinie this afternoon under an action to foreclose a mortgage in the sum of \$47,500 held by C. H. Page. The plant was purchased by the Astoria Budget for \$50.
