A few of our railroads have already assumed a commendable policy in this respect, their state which the average investor can under-state. Candor and buneaty are written on every pags. Such companies secure and de-serve public onfidence. This is not the case, however, with many of our industrials. These, to, ought to submit regular annual state-ments which can be comprehended by the average mind, and such statements should be certified to by public accountants of rec-ognized character and ability. The latter is a growing profession, and one deserving of all encouragement. In Eng-land it occupies a high standing and is much mone frequently resorted to than here. Heavy Shipments by Steel Trust During First Part of February.

Structural Demand Great.

NEW YORK. Feb. 28.—The Iron Age to-morrow will say: Fig iron is dull, so far as new huying is concerned, in nearly all markets and almost a deadlock between buyers and sellers pre-valle. It is accompanied by the indications of weakness which are created by a senal mi-notity of uneasy sellers. Some consumers he-lleve that the top has been reached and are withholding orders.
