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HOUSE BILL ON PURE FOOD

Heyburn's Measure Substituted for Heuburn's by Committee.

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WASHINGTON, March 7.—Representative Mann, of the House committee on interstate and foreign commerce today reported the enacting clause of the Senate pure food bill, following the provisions of the Heuburn bill which passed the House during the last session. He said:

The purpose of the pending measure is to prohibit the manufacture of foods in which are contained, in addition to the addition of foreign substances poisonous or deleterious to health. The question whether certain substances are poisonous or deleterious is left to the Secretary of Agriculture under the guidance of proper disinterested scientific authorities. The bill attempts to give a measure of protection to the consumer by prohibiting interstate traffic in falsely labeled or branded articles.

McLEAN ONLY JOKED ABOUT FRANKING

WASHINGTON, March 7.—John R. McLean, owner of the Washington Post, testified today before the House committee on postoffice and post roads concerning an editorial which appeared in the paper regarding alleged violations of the franking privilege by members of Congress. He said he had no evidence as to the truth of the statements in the editorial, that it was not written in a serious vein, and not intended to be taken seriously.

ANTI-PASS BILL IN COMMITTEE

WASHINGTON, March 7.—The Randall anti-pass bill was reported in amended form today to the entire House committee on judiciary by a subcommittee. It was made a special order for Friday morning, when the full committee will consider it. The bill prevents all Federal officers from accepting railway or Pullman passes, and also forbids their acceptance of franks from telegraph, telephone or express companies.

BILL TO PROTECT CHIFF DWELLINGS

WASHINGTON, March 7.—The House committee on public lands agreed today to make a favorable report on a bill to protect the historical landmarks and dwellings especially to preserve the cliff dwellings in New Mexico and Arizona, and provides that land on which objects of historic interest are located may be set aside by the Government and protected from vandals.

BILL TO LIFT TAX FROM ALCOHOL

WASHINGTON, March 7.—The House committee on ways and means asked Chairman Payne today to appoint a subcommittee of four, with himself as chairman, to draw a committee report on an exemption from internal revenue tax on grain alcohol rendered unfit for drinking purposes and designed for domestic and industrial use.

MARSHAL HOPKINS CONFIRMED

WASHINGTON, March 7.—The Senate in executive session confirmed the following nominations: Amos P. Wilder, Wisconsin, Consul-General at Honolulu; Charles E. Hopkins, Marshal Western District of Washington; J. N. Scott, postmaster at Kennebec, Wash.

NEW JOB FOR BALNBRIDGE

WASHINGTON, March 7.—W. E. Balnbridge, of Iowa, who recently declined the Consulship at Amoy, China, has been selected by Secretary Shaw to be special agent of the customs service at Paris, succeeding Major William H. Williams, who will be sent to another post.

Sigsbee's Squadron at Beirut

CONSTANTINOPLE, March 7.—The American Cruiser Squadron commanded by Rear-Admiral Sigsbee is expected to arrive at Beirut, Syria, tomorrow. It will stay there three days, after which the warships will go to Alexandria, Egypt.

RAISE MEXICAN VETERANS' PENSIONS

WASHINGTON, March 7.—Senator Stone today introduced a bill increasing the pensions of survivors of the Mexican War from \$12 to \$23 per month.
