

SHIP IS HELPLESS

Eskasoni's Crew Pray to Be Driven Ashore.

DETERMINED NOT TO SAIL

Lumber-Laden Vessel Has Perceptible List to Starboard, but is Declared to Be Perfectly Seaworthy.

Praying from the bottom of their hearts that the wind may increase in velocity and drive the vessel to the beach or against one of the docks that line the water front, the crew of the British ship Eskasoni is huddled together in the fore-cabin more determined than ever to refuse to go to sea.

The vessel has been driven to the beach since her masts were lowered last Friday, and is swinging dangerously near shore with the wind from the east. She got in front of the lower Astoria pier yesterday and in order to land the ferry had to make a big semi-circle around the wind-lammer.

Robertson, of the ferry, contacted the Harbormaster Blythe and the latter in turn notified Captain McCurdy, of the Eskasoni, to get the vessel out of the way, but the latter said he practically had no crew and was helpless. Thus the matter stood last night, and there is no telling how soon the difficulty will be settled unless the sailor boarding-house men send new men on board to take the place of the "stiffs."

Unfortunately for the sailor boarding-house men and their refusal to go to sea are American citizens, which would make the skipper liable should he attempt to make them go against their will. It is said that outside assistance will be given these men, and that their cases will be brought into court if their release can be secured in no other way.

A consultation was held on the forecastle head yesterday at noon by the sailors and they decided, so it is understood, to take the desperate chance of overpowering the armed watchman and leaping overboard onto the apron of the ferry when she swung past in making her West Side landing. 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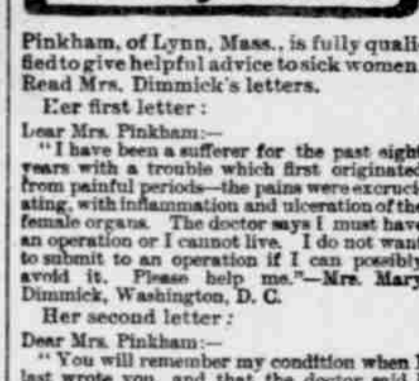
