CHAMPION BOWLING SCORES

Protest Against Midnight Playing. Split Threatens Congress.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 22 .- A special ournament of individual bowlers occupying the alleys in the National tournament early tonight furnished the most sensa-tional work of the meeting, three men finishing with totals of 675, 650 and 625. The highest figures were scored by Walter Tuthill, of Brooklyn, N. Y., who, with 675, takes first place in the individual class. His work beats anything in recent. years except that of "Deacon" Jones, of Milwaukce, who several years ago rolled 688 at Cleveland, but with a "loaded" ball, Yesterday's programme was not finished until after 2 o'clock this morning, when the Leisys No. 1, of Peoria, Ill., came near landing at the top of the list of five-men

Up to the ninth frame, the Leisys had every previous tournament record broken, but in the last frame a miss occurred which cost them their chances for championship, with a score of 2751. The Centuries No. 1, of Chicago, hold first place in this class, with a score of 2794, the Pastimes, of Cincinnati, being third, with 256 points. 

# SOBS DISTURB THE COURT TENNY'S MOTHER COMPELLED TO RESTRAIN GRIEF.

Hearing of Frankle Nell and Others Begun Before Police Judge Cabaniss at San Francisco.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 22.-The preiminary examination of Frankie Neil, Mark Shaughnessy, William Roche, "Solder" Kelly, Johnny Frayha and Thomas Hyland, for the alleged killing of Harry Tennebaum during a fight at the Me-chanics' Pavilion the night of February 25, was begun today before Police Judge Cabaniss. The proceedings were hardly under way before the sobs of the aged mother of the dead hoy disturbed the court. Judge Cabaniss suggested that she should be taken from the courtroom, but on promising to restrain her grief she

Edward Grancy stated that ar-ticles had been drawn up between Neil and Tenny, but that he had never seen them. 
