Fire Pump Will Be Installed on Dredge Columbia.

### **EAST SIDE FILLS A SUCCESS**

Port of Portland Makes Appropria tion for Many Improvements in Equipments for Deepening of Channel.

In passing upon routine matter yesterday afternoon the Port of Portland Commission appropriated several thousand dollars for improvement of its equip-ments. About 1000 feet of shore pipe will be purchased for use in making the East Side fills and a first-class pump for fire protection will be installed on the dredger

protection will be installed on the dredger Columbia. A new bunkhouse will be built on the dredger Columbia and some 19 pontoons belonging to the same dredger will be repaired and made good as new. Under existing conditions the dredger Columbia is practically without fire protection, the superintendent stated before the meeting, and the matter was considered of such importance that Captain A. L. Pease, President of the Port, was authorized to secure bids and award the contract for a pump without first having to report to the Commission, as is the procedure usually observed.

the dredger Portland until the East Side mud flats have been covered with gravel to a level above high water. Mr. Boise said the dredger was doing fine work, and to make it still more efficient, a telephone has been installed so that a man at the end of the pipe can keep the engineer of the dredge thoroughly posted as to how well the pump and digger are doing. This will overcome the possibility of pumping clear water at times and thus save much time and a great deal of expense.

# HAVE RIFLES THIS TIME

USED INSTEAD OF DYNAMITE TO SCARE RIVALS.

More Trouble Takes Place on North Bank Between Hill and Harriman Graders.

Reports from Stevenson, Wash., state that rifles figured in the conflict for rights of way between the Portland & Seattle Railway and the Columbia Valley Railroad yesterday at 'Cook's Landing, when a party of Hill graders maintained possession of a bunkhouse by menacing an opposing party of Columbia Valley laborers with weapons. No shots were fired

While occupying their bunkhouse, the Portland & Scattle crews are said to have Portland & Stattle crews are said to have been notified by Columbia Valley men to vacate the building, as it was claimed to be on the property of the latter company. The Columbia Valley graders installed their blankets in the building, pending the removal of the effects of the Hill graders. Later the Portland & Seattle gangs thought better of their determina-tion to more and when the formula tion to move, and when the demands were repeated, met their opponents with

The claims of the Harriman forces were not insisted upon under the circumstances, and the Hill laborers threw out the blankets of the Columbia Valley gauge and maintained possession.

### GOVERNOR IS

DENVER, April 12.—Chief Justice Gabbert of the State Supreme Court has filed a supplemental opinion in the Moyer case. It is generally con-ceded that this new opinion will take precedence over the former majority opinion as the latest expression of the

The Chief Justice declares that the Governor of the state has the power to suspend habeas corpus at his discre-tion, and that the courts cannot re-view the action. The body of the new opinion is taken up with excerpts from an opinion of Justice Johnson in a case in the Philippine Islands in which the power of the Governor-General to suspend the privileges of the writ of habeas corpus during a state of in-surrection in the Province of Batangas

was upheld.
