## SEWERS IN BAD CONDITION.

Plumbers and Doctors Most Needed.

# Clearing Away Debris,

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.-The inspec tion of the sewers made today by the Board of Fublic Works shows that the outlets to the systems in the residence section remaining unburned are all in

good condition save two. In the district south of Market street In the district sound of Alarket street few, if any, systems remain. President Massiretti, of the Board of Public Works, described the condition as "deplorable." in the business district no inspection has as yet been made.

The work of repairing the sewers needed at once is now under way. Gangs of workmen are being sent out. Teams and wagons have been secured, and some sort of order is being established. Plumbers and doctors are needed. Some are volun-teering, but the demand far exceeds the supply

The sanitation problem is becoming to reasingly difficult. Householders and ampers have been ordered to remove garbage and refuse to the curb lines on he streets. The Health Department has mpressed the wagons into service to cart away this debris. The supply of chloride of lime is nearly exhausted.

## All Are Now Penniless and New Chinatown Is Needed.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.-One of the first problems facing the relief commitlees on both sides of the bay is the shelering of the Chinese. Most of them. ormer rich and poor alike, are absolutely penniless and destitute. It has long been e question in San Francisco what should a question in San Francisco what should be done with Chinatown, and moving the Ihinese in the direction of Colma has been agliated. Now they are without homes and without prospects of securing any. They can get no land. The limits of Oakland's Chinatown have

siready been extended, and the strictest police regulations are in force to prevent further colargement. On this side of the bay they are camping in open lots, but, of course, this is the merest temporary shelter.

Unless the Government undertakes their relief, they are in grave danger. Those who have money cannot purchase prop-erty, as no one will sell to them. Few. however, even of the richest merchants in Chinatown, saved anything of value, for their wealth was invested in the Oriintal village which has sprung up in the neart of the burned district

of Health that the majority died from ptomaine poisoning. So many dead were found in this limited area that cremation was deemed absolutely necessary to prevent disease.

The names of some of the dead were learned, but in the majority of cases identification was impossible owing to the mutilation of the features.

A systematic search for bodies of the victims of the carthquake and fire was made today by the Coroner and the State Board of Health inspectors. The city has been divided into sanitary districts and squads of searchers have been sent out to every quarter. The rains of the burned buildings in the business and the old residence section have sufficiently cooled to make the search possible.
