



BACK FROM ORIENT

Portland-Asiatic Liner Nicomedia Makes Quick Trip.



Officers Report Having Spoken an American Barkentine Off the Coast, Using Code Discarded Long Ago.

The German steamer Nicomedia re-turned from the Orient at 10:30 o'clock last night, bringing 4500 tons of freight, including 3000 barrels of Ja-panese coment, which will come in handy at this particular time on ac-count of the scarcity of the material. The remainder of the cargo consists of matting, rice and general Chinese mer-chandles. Discharging will be com-menced at Montgomery Dock No. 1 this morning.


