Burnham Tells of San Francisco's Opportunity.

#### REPEAT NAPOLEON'S FEAT

Architect Says Ground Is Clear for Execution of His Plan, and May Go to the Burned City Next Week.

CHICAGO, April 27. Daniel H. Burn-ham, the architect who drew the plans for beautifying San Francisco, returned to his home here yesterday from Europe. He said San Francisco now has it within its power to rebuild itself into one of the most beautiful and convenient cities in

Burcham, on his arrival, found ing him a message from James D.

"The two chief features of my plan, which can now be carried into effect, are

MILITIAMAN SHOOTS WILDLY

Arrested by Marine Officer, Who Protests Against Release.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 27.-The first arrest for indiscriminate and reckless shooting by members of the state militia, which has made the streets in certain sections of the city controlled by the Netional Guard unsafe after dark, was made shortly before midnight, when Ernest L. Wilder, a militia sentry, was disarmed by Captain B. F. Bittenhouse, of the United States Marine Corps.

Captain Rittenhouse charged Wilder, who is from Visalia, 20 years old, and a raw private in Company E. Sixth Regiment, N. G. C., with leaving his post and "shooting up" the district commanded by Rittenhouse. arrest for indiscriminate and reckiess


