OREGON RELIEF BUREAU, Oakland, May 3.—J. N. Teal, representing the Portland relief committee, arrived this morning and spent the entire day in San Francisco. In addition to making the rounds of the hospitals and the relief camp established by the Oregon Relief Bureau, Mr. Teal discussed affairs with Dr. Devine, head of the Red Cross Society; General Greely and General Funston, but in spite of a hard day's work was unable to determine the best course for the Portland relief committee to pursue in expending the balance of the money now in its hands. Tomorrow Mr. Teal will talk with Chairman Phelps and other prominent members of the San Francisco finance committee.

Cannot Describe Scene.
Like other visitors to the ruins of San Francisco, Mr. Teal was sickened and awed at the terrible sights he saw. He was in a measure prepared to see what had been San Francisco in ruins, but he was not expecting to see the devastation of the vast acreage over which the fire had spread its fiery tongue.
"It is useless to attempt to express by mere words," said Mr. Teal on his return to Oakland tonight, "what a terrible calamity has befallen beautiful San Francisco. There is no way to describe it. It is a sight one must see before comprehending what a terrible thing has befallen the city."

Relief System Perfect.
"From conversations I had with General Funston and Dr. Devine, I am convinced that the distribution of supplies has reached a splendid system, one which, as time passes, will become more perfect. In my talks with physicians I learn that there is comparatively little sickness in the city. The sanitary conditions, I learn, are about as perfect as possible. There will be, I am told, no danger of disease breaking out if the people will follow instructions and boil the water they drink."

John Werc Badly Injured.
Yesterday I told of the search of the death records for John Werc, today developed the fact that he is alive. Mr. Werc was in the Oakland headquarters, having heard that we were searching for him. He was frightfully injured by a falling chimney which crashed through the roof and landed on his neck and chest. He was dug from the ruins and taken to the emergency hospital unconscious. His neck is still so badly injured that he cannot straighten up and he still suffers severe pains in his chest. Mr. Werc, however, has a pillow upon which he was sleeping. He was furnished with some necessary clothing by the Oregon Relief Bureau.

Courage of Portland Nurses.
The courage and training of the Portland nurses stationed at the Presidio hospital were admirably shown this morning, when a fire which destroyed the hospital laundry threatened all of the buildings. When the alarm was sounded, Dr. Marlow D. Esqui, also of Portland, called the nurses together and ordered them to their stations. Quietly and without the slightest confusion each nurse prepared her patients for removal from the wards and attended by herself when ordered. Fortunately the fire was checked and it was not necessary to remove any of them.
While this was going on some of the Presidio nurses forgot their patients in their excitement and desire to save their personal belongings.

WILD ORGIE AT SAKHALIN

Thousands of Drunken Convicts Burn and Loot Buildings.

ST. PETERSBURG, April 22.—(Belated letters from Alexandrovsky Post, North Sakhalin, bring a wild picture of the three weeks of murder and loot following the proclamation of peace and the evacuation by the Japanese to the northern half of the island.
The wilder spirits among the prisoners, criminal and political, were practically the entire population of Alexandrovsky Post, broke loose from all restraint, applied the torch to public and private buildings, drank themselves into a wild fury and vented their passions in pillage and murder.
Owing to the fierce October storms, the ships containing the troops dispatched to take possession of the island were driven off the coast, and Colonel Valuyeff, the Military Governor, landed with an escort of only 50 men, a scanty force with which to face hundreds of desperate convicts during the three weeks before further troops were able to land.
These convicts prepared a warm welcome for the new Governor, setting fire the day he landed to the police headquarters and the great Alexandrovsky Post prison, 10 separate buildings, with accommodations for thousands of prisoners.
These were completely consumed. The Japanese having allowed the fire engines to become useless, but by the strenuous exertions of the Russian and Japanese firemen, who worked side by side and patrolled the city to prevent further incendiarism, the fire was finally checked.
The next day the Japanese troops returned, having first sold their accumulated stocks of provisions and liquor at incredibly low prices. Casks of "sak," ordinarily sold for \$5, went for 10 cents, and cases of lined meat, containing 75 pounds, 50 cents. One hundred and seventy-five tons of rice and buckwheat were disposed of in a lump for \$100.
Everybody became drunk, and with provisions ending for the winter and no necessity for work, many of them kept up the debauch for weeks.
To protect the city, with his little garrison and the prisons destroyed.
