

GORKY AROUSED FROM ROSY DREAM

Hailed as "Liberator of Russia" He Soon Has to Conceal His Identity.

ACTRESS MADE TROUBLE

When It Was Discovered She Was Not His Wife, He Could Not Stay at Hotels and Prominent Men Ignored Him.

NEW YORK, May 6.—(Special.)—"Maxim Gorky's going out West tomorrow," a department man reported to the city editor of one of the big dailies the other day.

"What? Is he still here?" replied that individual in surprise. "You'd better wait a few lines about it. But keep it under a lock."

And this is the fate of the man who was heralded as "The Liberator of Russia," and was given more advance write-ups than any foreign visitor except Prince Henry. Gorky had the honor of being met down the Bay, when his steamer arrived, by 40 reporters, 16 cameramen and a tugboat of enthusiastic admirers. At the pier was a crowd of over 5000, cheering and waving their hats in the air.

When he left he skulked up to the Grand Central Depot, accompanied by "Mrs. Gorky" and one faithful friend. No crowds, not even one newspaper man, was there to do him reverence. He arrived like a hero; he departed like a drummer.

Hidden Under Assumed Name.

Gorky's life in New York has been something to weep about. Thrown out of hotels and apartment houses, he has hidden in a West Side tenement, and under an assumed name. The Russian novelist and his personal friends never realized how bitterly the American people would resent his action in bringing an actress here and passing her off as his wife. And the result has been a shock to them.

Gorky had planned a series of mass-meetings and a lecture tour, which would undoubtedly have raised a large fund for the revolutionists. His men like Joseph H. Choate, J. G. Phelps-Stokes, Nathan Straus, Jacob H. Schiff, Edward M. Grouse, Seth Low, John W. Wamaker and others of the solid men of the city had signified an intention of assisting and women's meetings, under the auspices of the leading society and charitable organizations of the city, were in progress of formation.

Swift and Bitter Transportation.

Gorky, snugly installed in luxurious apartments in a fashionable hotel, was receiving promises of a warm reception, and the weather indications were for a glorious and long-continued shower of gold. Then came the transformation scene. It was found that Mrs. Gorky was still in Russia, and that the Mrs. Gorky who appeared in the United States was another woman altogether. Down came Gorky from his pedestal, and the hotel proprietor, amid popular expressions of approval, hurried the erstwhile idol to the streets.

From that day Gorky has led the life of a pariah. Ejected from hotel after hotel, barred out of many apartment houses, he finally found shelter in a West Side room on Charleston street, where he resided under the name of Benjamin Simenovsky.

Could Not Spend His Money.

The rental he paid was \$15 a month. In the various hotels his rooms alone had cost him from \$125 a month up. He had money enough to pay his way, but every respectable door was shut against him, and only under an alias could he obtain shelter at all.

The big men who had promised to aid in his meetings, in declining to do so, had ignored him altogether; the women who had planned to co-operate hastily abandoned their preparations. The "Russian patriot" had held exactly one meeting in New York City, and was warmly greeted by a large number of Russians, but the American citizens who had been expected were conspicuous by their absence. In fact, the entire cause had been a newspaper reporter's, and they were not the star men either, for Gorky had become a person of little importance.

Could Not Realize Situation.

After that one appearance Gorky has remained in seclusion. His companions visited him, but many of them advised him to go home. They told him his mission was useless, and that he could never expect to gain the attention or the money of the American people. But Gorky has been persistent, and has carried on a campaign of which little or nothing has been said.

Gorky has written to millionaires and philanthropists, only to have the mortification of having his letters ignored or his propositions coldly rejected. He has called at their offices or their homes, but is turned away, and outside of a few of his countrymen there are none to do him reverence.

Nobody Cares for Gorky.

Now Gorky, the novelist, the patriot and the improperly designated man of the hour, has gone away, and nobody cares where he has gone, or whether he ever returns. Probably when he reaches Russia again, he will bitterly say New York and New Yorkers for the way he has been treated, but it is doubtful whether he will be accorded the dignity of a spreadhead in the newspapers.

Poor Gorky! His fame lasted but a little time. This requiem was uttered today by Congressman Timothy D. Sullivan, the philosopher of the Bowery.

"Gorky got in wrong; that was all. He could have come over here, and drank and had a good time, and no one would have cared. They might have called him eccentric (down here we'd say bughouse), but it would have all come out in the wash."

TRAINS ARE SOON TO RUN

Within Eighteen Months, Says President of the St. Paul.

TACOMA, Wash., May 6.—(Special.)—President Earling, of the Milwaukee & St. Paul Railway Company, accompanied by President Williams, arrived in Tacoma from Seattle yesterday. In an interview Mr. Earling said:

"I have no announcement to make which will particularly startle residents of Tacoma, but I feel safe in saying that within 18 months the people of this city will see the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul trains running in and out of Tacoma."

"Of course, the through line to the

East will not be completed for probably two and a half or three years. However, there will be several hundred miles of track laid out of Tacoma before that time. The most difficult pieces of engineering are beginning on this side of the Cascades.

"Crossing the Cascades will require more time than any piece of work on an new line, and while it is in progress work will also be under way on the other side of the mountains. By the time the line from Tacoma is completed across the Cascades there will be 100 or 400 miles of track extending east which will be ready for connection with it. The work of construction in the Missouri Valley country will be commenced at both ends and in the middle.

"I can say nothing at the present time in regard to the depot site in Tacoma."

Boschke in Charge of Survey.

TACOMA, Wash., May 6.—(Special.)—George W. Boschke, of Portland, Ore., engineer of the O. R. & N., came to Tacoma yesterday to take charge of the Union Pacific survey of Jefferson avenue. Mr. Boschke will divide his time now between Portland and Tacoma. Though he will superintend the construction work here and of the Puget Sound extension, he will be guided by the advice and instructions of William Hood, of San Francisco, chief engineer of the Southern Pacific.

The Union Pacific is about ready to throw off all secrecy and work in the open. The road's plans are nearly matured and an announcement of the privileges desired in Tacoma will shortly be made.

STRIKE SURELY AVERTED

OPERATORS EXPECTED TO PROMISE NO DISCRIMINATION.

Agreement for Three Years Will Be Accepted by the Miners If Insisted Upon.

SCRANTON, Pa., May 6.—Nothing developed today to disturb the general belief that a strike of the anthracite miners would be averted. There seems to be every assurance that the sub-scale committee of the organization, which will go to New York early tomorrow morning for a conference tomorrow afternoon with the operators, will be assured by the latter that there will be no discrimination shown in case the men are ordered back to work and that the terms of the agreement will be agreed upon.

The sub-scale committee is composed of President Mitchell, the three district presidents, and the three district secretaries. They will return to this city from New York after the conference tomorrow afternoon, and will report to the convention Tuesday morning at a special session to be held in Music Hall.

It is expected that the convention will ratify their report and vote for a resumption of work on Monday, May 14, under the terms of the anthracite strike commission.

While President Mitchell would prefer an agreement for two years, both he and the other members of the committee, it is understood, will bow to the wishes of the operators and accept an agreement for three years, if the latter so desire it.

Holding Strikers in Line.

DETROIT, May 6.—President D. J. Keefe, of the International Longshoremen's Marine and Transport Workers' Association, who is directing the marine strike on the Great Lakes, left tonight supposedly for Cleveland. It is rumored that his hurried trip is because the strikers were showing an inclination to return to work and leave the union mates, over whom the symbolic strike was declared, to shift for themselves.

President Joyce, of the Grainscoopers' Union, visited this city today and tonight held a conference with Mr. Keefe and Secretary-Treasurer Barker, of the longshoremen. President Keefe refused to discuss the situation at Buffalo, except to say briefly that "things looked all right."

LINE CUT TO MAZATLAN

Mexican National Railway Engineers Succeed After Year's Work.

MEXICO CITY, May 6.—Engineers of the Mexican National Railway have succeeded in cutting a line from Durango to Mazatlan on the Pacific Coast. The locating work has been going on for a year. It is probable that the interoceanic railway will build an extension to the oil fields from Tuxtla.

President's Wife a Patroness.

MEXICO CITY, May 6.—The law students and theatrical people of this city are organizing fetes, the proceeds of which will be forwarded to San Francisco for the relief of the earthquake and fire sufferers there. Mme. Diaz, wife of the president of the republic, will act as patroness of these entertainments.

SHOWED ROLL OF BILLS

Body of Young Japanese Is Found Afterward in Creek.

NEW YORK, May 6.—The body of Eijiro Nahanu, the 23-year-old son of a wealthy Japanese banker, who disappeared from a hotel in this city April 28, was found tonight in a creek running between Bergen and Hudson Counties, New Jersey.

A reward of \$500 had been offered for information as to Nahanu's whereabouts. He was supposed to have had \$5000 in cash with him. Tonight only \$136 was found in his clothing. His gold watch was missing. Nahanu was near Fairview, N. J., the night of April 28, when he displayed a roll of bills.

MISREAD HIS ORDERS.

Engineer Held Responsible for Fatal Pennsylvania Wreck.

ALTOONA, Pa., May 6.—The official report of the collision Friday night between the east-bound Chicago and St. Louis express and the Pittsburgh and Erie Pennsylvania Railroad, which caused the death of ten persons and the injury of many others, lays the blame on Engineer T. Dougherty, who was heading the westbound train and who, it is claimed, misunderstood his orders.

Guineau Juror Is Dying.

WASHINGTON, May 6.—(Special.)—William Bright, one of the two surviving jurors who tried Guineau, and upon whom, with others, was put a spectacular curse by Garfield's assassin, is near death's door from a wasting disease.

County Fair Building Burned.

SPOKANE, May 6.—Fire at Davenport, Wash., today destroyed the county fair building, in which was stored a steam merry-go-round. The total loss is \$4000.

VOTERS ARE QUIET

French Parliament Elections Held Without Riots.

RECORD POLL IS CAST

Returns From the Provinces Show That the Government Supporters Have Succeeded in Capturing Large Number of Seats.

PARIS, May 6.—The results thus far announced in the general parliamentary elections, which were held today, show few changes in the Chamber, most of the former Deputies being re-elected, but an extraordinary number of second ballots will be necessary in Paris. The present ballot gives the opposition a majority, but the second ballot, which will be taken May 20, is expected to reproduce the results of the 1902 election, when the representation of the capital was equally divided. Nevertheless the government has gained one seat.

It is estimated that there was a record poll of votes. Owing to the excitement caused by the recent strike and the disorders occasioned by the taking of inventories of church property, the polling booths were guarded by military and police, but the day passed practically without incident, and intervention by the authorities was unnecessary.

Great crowds this evening surrounded the Hotel de Ville, the Ministry of the Interior and the newspaper offices, where results of voting were posted, cheering on hoisting when the return of popular candidates was announced. The success of prominent men, such as MM. Briand, Freyssinet, Millerand, Lockroy and Millevoye and Admiral Bienaimé, was greeted with enthusiasm.

Marcel Habert, director of the League of Patriots, was defeated. Police and cavalry patrols prevented demonstration by the disorderly element, and good humor was generally prevalent. Provincial returns display an unexpectedly favorable tendency toward the government, whose supporters have captured no fewer than 18 seats, against a loss of only two. Including Paris, 411 results are known. Of these the government captured 188 seats and the opposition 122, while 111 require second ballots. The net gain to the government is 18 seats.

MM. Doumer, President of the Chamber of Deputies, Clementel, ex-Minister of the Colonies; Leygues, Minister of the Colonies in the Sarrien Cabinet; Laisant, the anti-Semite leader; Doumergue, Minister of Commerce; Folléat, ex-Minister of Marine; Brisson, ex-President of the Chamber, and the Duke de Broglie, were all re-elected.

SUSPECTS ARE SET FREE.

Prominent Persons Alleged to Have Been Involved in Royalist Plot.

PARIS, May 6.—All the persons arrested recently for connection with the alleged royalist plot against the security of the republic have been provisionally released.

Among those taken into custody as a result of a series of wholesale searches designed to unearth an extensive plot against the security of the republic were M. Griederhues, the virtual head of the Confederation of Labor; Leon Robert, secretary of a branch of the confederation; Count de Beauregard, who was alleged to be at the head of the plot against the government; Major Feuilleant, formerly commander of the Imperial Guard, and Gilbert, editor of the Imperial Journal L'Autorité.

Sultan Seeks to Reopen Case.

CONSTANTINOPLE, May 6.—The Sultan has attempted to reopen discussion regarding the Tabah affair, but the British Ambassador has declined to do so. It is reported that the Sultan wishes to submit the question to The Hague.

Owing to the intervention of the feast of Easter, the note presented to the Porte last Thursday by Sir Nicholas O'Connor, the British Ambassador, is expected before Wednesday.

Royalty Dines Postal Delegates.

ROME, May 6.—King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Helena tonight dined in honor of the delegates to the International Postal Congress. Edward Rosewater, of Omaha, and Captain N. B. Brooks, Superintendent of the United States Postoffice, attended.

British Fleet in Phaleron Bay.

LONDON, May 6.—A dispatch to a news agency says that the British fleet, under Vice-Admiral Lord Charles Beresford, has arrived in Phaleron Bay.

BAND OF BULGARIANS WIPED OUT.

SALONICA, European Turkey, May 6.—Turkish troops on Saturday exterminated a band of 40 Bulgarians at Loydiza, near Kioptilli. The Turks had two men killed.

THE DAY'S DEATH ROLL

Mother of Mrs. Potter Palmer.

CHICAGO, May 6.—Mrs. Henry H. Honore, mother of Mrs. Potter Palmer, a pioneer resident of Chicago, died at her home here today as the result of a fall last Wednesday. She was 80 years old.

Armstrong Bust Is Unveiled.

HAMPTON, Va., May 6.—(Special.)—With spectacular ceremony and in the presence of a great multitude of people from many parts of the country, the Hampton Normal and Agricultural Institute began today the celebration of its 35th anniversary by the unveiling of a bust of General Armstrong, founder of Hampton.

Theological Commencement.

PRINCETON, N. J., May 6.—The 94th annual commencement of Princeton Theological Seminary started today, and will last through Tuesday. There are 31 graduates, while the degree of bachelor of divinity will be conferred upon 20 who have qualified for the extra course.

Valuable By-Product Lost.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., May 6.—Fire in the storage yards of the Wenrick-Mariner Chemical Company, in the western suburb of this city tonight destroyed 15,000 tons of bating draught, a resin waste used by the company in making oil, valued at \$25,000. The retorts and buildings of the company were in great danger, but were saved by hard work.

Ogden Warehouses Burned.

OGDEN, May 6.—A fire in the wholesale district today destroyed the warehouses of the Boyle Furniture Company, and Runyon Hyde Company, and damaged the warehouse of George A. Lowe Hardware Company. The loss is \$35,000, partly covered by insurance.

50 yards from Stewart's home. The shot that killed Winters came from a gun of larger caliber than Stewart's, and today Jim Hunt, 25th, Boyle and Newton Winters were arrested, charged with complicity in the murder of Winters. No light has been thrown on the manner of Winters' death.

MOB FIRES ON HOUSE

TENNESSEAN AND HIS YOUNG DAUGHTER WOUNDED.

Dead Body of Man Found Near House When Attackers Are Driven Away.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., May 6.—Marvin Winters was shot and killed and Thomas Stewart and his young daughter severely wounded during an attack by a mob on Stewart's home near Pleasant View, Cheatham County, last night. No reason for the attack is known. A few days ago Stewart received a letter warning him that if he and Stewart and his daughter were not killed within ten days they would all be killed.

About 10 o'clock Saturday night a mob surrounded Stewart's house and opened fire on it and Stewart and his daughter were wounded. Stewart returned the shots and the mob scattered. This morning the body of Marvin Winters was found about

suitable places in which to live. Many of these rooms had no light except what came through the door. Last year Milan voted on the question of municipal participation in plans for providing better homes for working people. The majority in favor was very large, and many modern tenements will be built at once, and 48 of these new buildings will contain 200 rooms each, which will be divided into one and two and three-room apartments.
