Bill Essick went in to bat for Garvin. Essick was noted out of a tight decision at first and the air became blue with language. McHale walked and stole second and Sweeney died trying. Then Mitchell, who had won a sixty-dollar bet, a timely two-bagger in the fifth, swiped the ball for another two sacks and the score that tied the game came rolling home.

Portland won on the eleventh. Califf, who had supplanted Garvin, was as steady as a clock, and no scores rewarded the Oakland batsmen. When Portland came to bat in the eleventh, McHale drew a pass after Califf was down. Jimmy pliffed second and went to third on Sweeney's single. Graham was afraid of Mitchell and walked home. WINNING ATHLETES RETURN

PLEASED WITH THE TRI-STATE MEET AT SEATTLE.

W. L. Hayward, Trainer of the Oregon Men, Comments Their Good Work.

The victorious track team of the University of Oregon returned from Seattle yesterday morning after winning the championship of the Pacific Northwest in the big Decoration day meet. The young varsity athletes spent an hour or so at the Union Depot, and left for Eugene on the 8:30 A. M. train. They were highly elated over their success, but have not given up training, for they have another hard meet on their schedule. In order to retain the coveted championship, Oregon must win the intercollegiate meet at Salem June 9. Despite the fact that they have already defeated the Oregon Agricultural College team, the varsity athletes believe that they have a very hard meet ahead of them, and will train faithfully during the next few days.

"We naturally feel elated over our success," said Trainer W. L. Hayward yesterday morning. "The Oregon athletes have trained faithfully for many weeks, and they deserved to win. Our team is composed of a fine lot of fellows, and I am proud of them all. The Seattle meet was a great success, and was attended by an unusually large crowd. Kelly was very fast in the sprints, but the track at Seattle is so hard and uneven that he was unable to show his best. Moore, McKimney, Friesell, Moulton and Kelly are six mighty fine athletes, and then Oregon has several others that are sure point-winners. We were well treated at Seattle, and the meet was characterized by good feeling throughout. Judging from the great success of yesterday's contest, I predict that the Oregon-Washington-Idaho track meet will be a regular event from now on."

Hayward is one of the best-known trainers on the Coast, and his many friends in this city are delighted over the success of his speedy men. Hayward trained the Multnomah Amateur Athletic Club athletes last Summer, his team winning the P. N. A. championship meet at the Lewis and Clark Fair.

CRUSADE AGAINST PUGILISM

McGovern-Britt Case Only One of Many in New York.

NEW YORK, May 31.—The hearing of the cases of James Britt and Terry McGovern, pugilists, and 14 other persons arrested after the boxing match in Madison Square Gardens, was not completed this afternoon.

Police Commissioner Bingham in a statement today regarding the orders to Sheriff Hayes declared that the police have made 119 arrests for prize fighting since January 1 and 21 arrests are for aiding and abetting prize fighting. He said that most of the cases had been turned over to the court and that the trouble seems to arise over the interpretation of the law by the lower courts.

CAMP AT AMERICAN LAKE

WASHINGTON MILITIA TO MANEUVER WITH REGULARS.

Government Has Undertaken to Pay All Expenses From August 5 to 12.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—Governor Mead today completed arrangements with Assistant Secretary of War Robert Shaw Oliver, through Adjutant General Drain, for the participation of the entire state militia of Washington in joint maneuvers with the regular Army at American Lake, from August 5 to 12, inclusive. The state militia is to arrive in camp August 4.

Assistant Secretary Oliver says the Government will undertake to pay the entire expense of the state militia for the week named, with the understanding that such portion as it will be unable to meet will be paid by the state from its allotment. Seven joint maneuver camps are contemplated for the entire country this Summer, the appropriation being \$200,000.

General Drain will return from Washington as soon as the militia allotment bill is acted upon, and will then issue the

necessary orders for the camp and the season's target work. The militia allotment bill increases the annual appropriation for the support of the state militia from \$1,000,000 to \$2,000,000.

STEALING IS NOT PROVED

Seattle Firemen Are Given Preliminary Hearing and Dismissed.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—Second Assistant Fire Chief Robert Laitham, Captain C. C. Graham and Fireman Longbottom were today discharged by Commissioner Kiefer, before whom they were given a preliminary hearing on the charge of looting Government stores during the Arlington dock fire. The Government could not demonstrate their charge that the firemen had committed larceny of Government goods.

It has been acknowledged by most of the firemen that they carried away a part of the supplies, but the defense is being urged that these were given them by men in authority at Arlington dock. Two firemen have already been bound over to the Federal grand jury.

Section of State Road Approved.

OLYMPIA, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—The State Highway Board met today, examined the profiles of the Kittitas branch

of the Snoqualmie Pass road, declared the route feasible and approved the right of way selected from Easton to the summit of the Cascades. The first section to be built will be from the summit of the Cascades southwesterly to a point one mile south of Lake Kachela. The maximum grade will be 5 per cent on a few hundred feet of this ten-mile section.

The cost of clearing this right of way is estimated at \$250. State Highway Commissioner Snow left tonight for Okanogan County to consult with the County Commissioners in reference to the Northern State road.

Rain Does Immense Good.

SPOKANE, Wash., May 31.—(Special.)—Wheatgrowers who have been praying for rain have been answered by one of the most copious downpours the Inland Empire has known for years. Even in Central Washington reports are that for three days rain has been falling and the end is not yet.

In the vicinity of Lind volunteer wheat will yield 15 bushels to the acre, from present indications. In the Palouse country every farm is drenched, and the moisture is welcome.

No damage to crops is reported by the downpour in the Spokane country. On the contrary, the soil contains enough moisture to bring the grain to maturity.

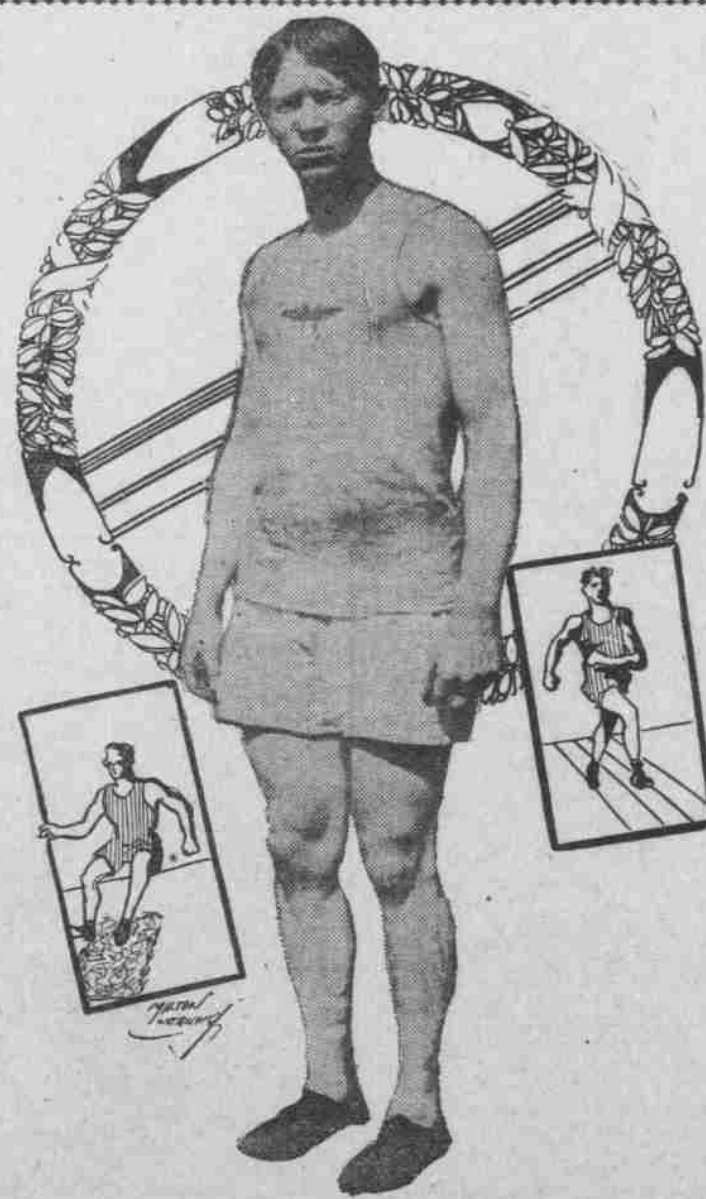
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DAN M. KELLY, U. OF O. SPRINTER AND LEAPER

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Or., May 31.—(Special.)—Daniel M. Kelly, Jr., is a sophomore in the University and a resident of Baker City. He is 22 years old and has an ideal build for an athlete. He first distinguished himself as an athlete at the Baker City High School, and afterward attended Columbia University, in Portland, for a year, where he won additional laurels. Under the careful coaching of Trainer "Bill" Hayward, Kelly has suddenly sprung into prominence as one of the best men in the country. In the meets of this season he has put Northwest sprinting records down to 9 4-5 for the 100-yard dash, 22 seconds for the 220-yard dash and has set a new mark of 24 feet, 2 1-2 inches for the Pacific Coast record for the broad jump.

Kelly is a modest, manly fellow, a bright student and a great favorite on the Oregon campus.
