ADDITIONAL PORTLANDS NEEDED.
 The growth of Portland has continued to such an extent during the last year that Postmaster Minto has found it necessary to call upon the Postoffice Department to furnish some additional space for the relief of the main Postoffice of this city, and H. B. Hall, of the salary and allowance division, has been requested to report to the department what relief can be afforded. It is Postmaster Minto's idea that a carrier station established within two blocks of Sixth and Davis, with a floor space of approximately 200 feet, for the accommodation of the carriers supplying that portion of the city, together with a sufficient number of clerks to transact the necessary postal business, would relieve the main office to such an extent that the present space would suffice for some time to come.

ARRANGING FOR TWO LIBRARIES.—Mrs. W. E. Potter, of the Mount Tabor Home Training Circle, is making arrangements to establish two branch libraries in that neighborhood. One at East Forty-fourth street, at the store of G. W. Gibson, has been arranged for, and the books will be there by the first of next week. Mr. Gibson has consented to look after the books. There will also be a table at the library for making notes. This library will contain 50 books selected from the Portland Library with reference to the needs of the district, and these may be changed every week. If interest is desired also to establish a book station at Mount Tabor, near West avenue and the Base Line road, as soon as a depository can be arranged for.

WILL CELEBRATE TEXAS DAY.—Texas day will be celebrated by the Daughters of the Confederacy at Ringier's Hall, 609 Alder street, this evening. A fine program, including instrumental and vocal music and papers on Texas history, has been prepared, and at its close the guests will enjoy an old-time Southern dance, and refreshments will be served. The Portland women who are natives of the Lone Star State are expected to act as hostesses, and all Southerners, irrespective of state, are cordially invited to be present and enjoy the hospitality of the Texas contingent.

Harrison, of Worcester, Mass., National secretary of children's work of the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society. Of the ladies of the Columbia River branch, Mrs. Upmeyer, of Harrisburg, Or., local secretary, will also be present, and both will speak. All interested are invited.

FACTORY MAY CONTINUE.—C. Leifer's factory for boiling ham at East Forty-fifth and East Alder streets may be run without objection from the authorities. Complaint has been made against it by the neighbors, but Health Officer Wheeler and representatives of the Police Department have investigated the case, and do not maintain the contention that the factory's presence leads to unsanitary conditions in the vicinity.

BOTH ASK FOR A REHEARING.—W. P. Lillis, who was dismissed a few days ago from the city engineering department, yesterday submitted to the Civil Service Commission a request for an investigation of the causes leading up to his dismissal, and a view to being reinstated. H. V. McGinnis, who was discharged from the police force, also applied for an investigation of his case, which will take place Wednesday morning.

WANTS TO REMOVE RUBBISH FILLS.—Francis I. McKenna is desirous of being notified of the presence of rubbish and debris which were gathered in piles during the clearing-up day. Many piles were made, and some of them have not been removed. Mr. McKenna stated yesterday that he would pay for the removal of such accumulations from his own pocket, and requests that he be notified of the location of them.

TALKS OF GROWTH OF CHILDREN.—Dr. J. Allen Gilbert's address before the Home Training Association yesterday afternoon on "Mental and Physical Culture Development of Children" was pronounced one of the most instructive and interesting discourses ever given before that body. Charts were used in illustration, and Dr. Gilbert's broad experience and the close study he has given this subject in the past enabled him to present facts about child development in an unusually interesting light. One chart gave the comparative height of boys and girls of like age, another, weight and lung capacity. The necessity of proper recreation for children was emphasized and parents admonished to pay particular attention to this feature.

RURAL LETTER-CARRIERS WILL MEET.—Today the fourth annual convention of the Oregon Rural Letter-Carriers Association will open in K. C. P. Hall, between Sixth and Alder streets, and continue throughout the week, closing Sunday night. Efforts will be made to have the most successful year as yet, and an increase of salary of rural carriers from \$60 to \$80 a month, the amount received by city carriers.

I HAVE paid \$2.50 for worse. It would be more accurate and precise to say that there was nothing but what I was to say that I have bought high-priced tickets to potent concerts in New York that were not so good as the concert given by W. H. Boyer at the Hall. The concert last evening was a masterpiece. This is not saying too much. Perhaps it is not saying enough. If it conveys the impression that the effort last night has my unqualified approval, I shall be satisfied. I am but one person, and I can give but a report of the result of the programme upon me. But my culture and experience in such matters will serve for the average, and there is no doubt whatever that Mr. Boyer's offering was important and unusual, if not remarkable. I think the concert would have commanded more than ordinary attention in any city of this country.

In the first place, you do not get Verdi's Requiem every evening nor by a large majority of evenings. Of evenings, only got parts of it last night, but they were great parts, representative parts, and the rendering was vastly interesting. Mr. Boyer's conductor and orchestra here, and the choral work he drove out of those 50 voices was astonishingly fine. Earnestness and verve are his chief characteristics. He is in the job, a vibrant intellect, active with arms and eyes, watchful as a cat, molding and well-keeping whipping everyone and everything into shape during the week and at the Union Depot Sunday morning.
