State Takes Up Cause of San Francisco Victims

IN ADJUSTING INSURANCE

All Companies Which Refuse More Time to Prove Loss Will Be Outlaws—Appeal to Congress to Indorse Bonds.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—At a conference today between Insurance Commissioner E. Myron Wolf and F. C. Coogan, attorney of the underwriters, Mr. Wolf warned the latter that he would immediately call for a list of policyholders from every company which failed to sign an agreement to extend to 60 days the time for proof of loss.

The notification is equivalent to a declaration of war on all companies which have not signed. The statute provides a \$1000 penalty for failure to respond to the demand. In effect, the order will compel every company to grant the extension or go out of business in this state. The sweeping order applies to more than half of the companies doing business in the city, and is designed by Mr. Wolf to complete the work begun when a notice was served on all the companies suggesting that all sign an agreement which would prevent policies from lapsing through the inability of the insured to get their proofs made out in time. The policyholders of the Traders' Insurance Company will form a corporation to look after their interests in the litigation which will be brought to compel that company to meet all obligations in full. This was determined at a meeting of the policyholders held in this city today.

WILL NATION INDORSE BONDS?

San Francisco Committee Goes to Ask Roosevelt.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—Following lengthy telegraphic communication with President Roosevelt, a subcommittee of the Citizens' Finance Committee left this morning for Washington in E. H. Harriman's private car for the purpose of learning the President's views on the proposed bonds of San Francisco in the sum of \$200,000,000. The committee comprises Walter J. Barnett, Judge W. W. Morrow, Dr. Devine, of the Red Cross, and Benjamin Ide Wheeler, and it will be met in the East by Mr. Harriman, the fifth member of the subcommittee.

Franklin K. Lane, of this city, who has been in New York for many weeks, has obtained the promise, it is said, of Wall Street financiers to take the bond issue, provided the United States indorses the bonds. The money thus raised is to be used for the rehabilitation and reconstruction of San Francisco.

HARDEST ON HOME COMPANIES

Figures on Fire Loss and Capital and Surplus.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The Chronicle publishes a statement showing the capital and surplus of the insurance companies which lost by the recent fire and their estimated risks in this city, the total of the latter being placed at \$296,789,000. "From this," says the Chronicle, "deduct 15 per cent. to arrive at the insurance in the burned district, and one has the total of \$252,265,000. The domestic companies, on the 15 per cent deduction, have risks to the amount of \$133,153,500 in the burned district, and to meet it have a capital and surplus of \$131,427,000. While the risks of the foreign companies, on that basis, amount to \$114,257,750, and their surplus in America amounts to only \$31,989,000, yet they have a world capital and surplus of \$128,887,000."

Troops Gradually Leave City.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 7.—The military authorities are gradually withdrawing all of the Government forces from the city, and within a few weeks, San Francisco will be entirely under the protection of the regular police force, assisted by a large number of specials which has been added to the list since the fire. It has been the plan of those who have had charge of the city's protection to have the troops withdrawn gradually, and for the last few weeks three companies have been recalled, one at a time, and sent back to their proper stations, until now only a few remain here to do guard duty, which do not properly belong to posts about the bay.

Wants Island for Terminus.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 7.—A concurrent resolution introduced in the Senate by Mr. Shortridge and in the Assembly by Mr. Atkinson provides that the United States Government be requested to cede to the State of California the island of San Francisco Bay known as Goat Island or Yerba Buena, to be used by the state as a terminal for different railroad companies.

HEAR LAND CASES TODAY

Three Wisconsin Men May Be Sent Here for Trial.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 7.—(Special.)—Assistant United States Attorney E. J. Henning has gone to Shawano, where the case of three lumbermen indicted recently in connection with the Oregon land frauds will come up before United States Commissioner Dillett tomorrow. The question to be determined is whether the indictment contains facts sufficient to warrant binding the men over and sending them to Oregon for trial.

Gorky Will Return to Russia.

CHICAGO, June 7.—Maxim Gorky, the Russian revolutionist, arrived in Chicago today and went to the home of Dr. Henry A. Frankel at 413 South Halsted street. He had nothing to say today except that what he had read in the papers regarding the stockyards had made him desirous of visiting them, and that he would return East next week and soon sail for Russia.
