SAYS OREGON'S LAW IS LAX

DR. MILLER ON REQUIREMENTS FOR PHYSICIANS.

At Meeting of Homeopathic Medical Society Gives Reasons for Other States' Actions.

The State Homeopathic Medical Society met yesterday in its thirteenth annual convention at the Alisky Hall, with Dr. P. L. McKenna, of Portland, in the president's chair. The morning session was devoted to routine business and the election of officers for the ensuing year. The following were elected: Dr. A. W. Vincent, of St. Johns, president; Dr. D. O. Webster, of University Park, vice-president; Dr. Nellie Smith-Vernon, second vice-president; Dr. Emma J. Welby, treasurer, and Dr. Charles Billington, secretary.

The board of censors and the legislative committee were re-elected for another year. The attendance at the morning session was not very large, but in the afternoon more than 30 members were present to hear the discussions. Dr. Byron B. Miller, member of the State Board of Medical Examiners, addressed the convention, mentioning the comparative laxity of Oregon laws in regard to the admission of applicants to practice medicine in this state. He said that the reason Oregon was unable to make any reciprocal treaties with other states in regard to the exchange of doctors' certificates, was that in Oregon it was not necessary to be a graduate of a medical college to be admitted to the examinations. The Oregon examination, said the speaker, was not below that of the strictest state in the Union, but he admitted that the probable reason why California refused to make a reciprocal treaty with this state some time ago was that several doctors practicing in this state were not graduates of any college.

The afternoon session opened with the president's address, after which the following programme was carried out:

A committee of three doctors was appointed to honor the memory of the late Dr. G. S. Wigg, of this city, and the session adjourned till 10:30 o'clock this morning.

HALF OUT AND HALF IN

Peculiar Situation of the Mount Tabor School District.

The situation of Mount Tabor School district No. 3 is somewhat peculiar. The north half, in which a considerable portion of the school children live, is now in the city and part of Portland district, or will be July 1, while that part south of the Base Line road is part of the city, but is not connected with the Portland district. This situation was brought about when the south half was annexed to Portland, a special provision being made that the school should not be affected. The schoolhouses, except a two-room structure, are in the southern portion. To remedy the situation and bring the entire district, with all its property, under the control of Portland district No. 1, all the taxpayers of No. 3 will vote at the school meeting to be held in the West avenue building Monday evening, June 18.

If annexation should happen to be defeated in the Mount Tabor district, it would give Portland the north half of the district with a lot of children without schoolhouses, but would leave out a fragment of the Mount Tabor district with two large schoolhouses and with few pupils. However, annexation is expected to carry by a large majority. The present corps of 15 teachers, except Superintendent Adams, who goes to the Portland Academy in the Fall, will be re-elected for district No. 3.

ROTATION IN THE SHIFTS

POLICEMEN ON GRAVEYARD WATCH SIGN PETITION.

Ask That Every Four Months the Men Be Changed on These Watches.

Believing that considerable favoritism has been shown in assigning policemen to each of the three reliefs, those who do duty on the second night relief, commonly known as the "graveyard watch," have signed and presented to Chief Gritzmacher, to be given to Mayor Lane, a petition asking that each relief be assigned to duty for a period of four months on every shift.

Under the present system there are policemen who have traveled beats during eight hours of daylight for several years without a change, while others, many of whom have wives and families, have never, with the exception of an hour or two in the afternoon, seen the sun. Portland is the only city on the Pacific Coast that has such a system, but repeated complaints have been of no avail. At the recent police inspection Mayor Lane asked that any grievances which they might have be submitted to him and that, if it were in his power, he would right them if possible. Taking the Mayor at his word, the following petition, has been drawn up and forwarded to him:

"Whereas, We, in common with all fair-minded people, believe in a 'square deal' for all, and that it should be able and willing to serve on any beat or shift, otherwise he could not be considered a well-qualified policeman, we, the undersigned members of the second night relief, four months on the first night relief, four months on the day relief. Believing this to be of great importance regarding both the service to the public and harmony among the policemen, we pray that you give this your most earnest consideration, especially as the entire police force is in sympathy with this request."

The petition was signed by all members of the second night relief with one or two exceptions.

East Side Outvotes West Side.

At the election held June 4, for the first time in the history of Portland, more votes were cast on the East Side of the river than on the West Side. The total vote polled in the county was 15,797, and this was cast as follows: East Side with-

in the city limits, 8483; West Side, 8265, and county precincts, 2978. In the county precincts the majority vote was polled on the East Side. The number of electors registered in the county was 23,966, and largest vote, 14,269, was cast for County Clerk Fields.

WANT ANOTHER FIREBOAT

INCREASED INSURANCE RATES REQUIRE MORE PROTECTION.

Business Men of Portland Intend to Submit Bill to Legislature Authorizing a New Boat.

Business men of this city are agitating the building of another fireboat for use as a means of fire protection along Portland's growing water front. The merchants behind this move are not condemning the boat now in use, for they are almost unanimous in their approval of the efficiency of the George H. Williams, but they desire another boat which would add to the safeguarding against disastrous fires along the river.

The men who are behind the proposition to secure the added protection state that the increase in insurance rates for certain portions of this city are becoming prohibitive and that unless something is done very shortly to relieve the situation, business firms will be out considerably by the high rates.

The proposition involves a plan for the submission of a bill to the next Legislature providing for the building of a new fireboat to be larger and faster and capable of throwing heavier streams than the boat now in use, which shall be built by the City of Portland within a certain time. The provisions for the new boat require that it shall be constructed of steel and be equipped with all the latest up-to-date fire-fighting appliances, and provisions are to be made later for the berthing and housing of the vessel and crew.

In referring to the proposition, E. M. Brannick stated that the Portland Commercial Club and Chamber of Commerce were behind the movement and that these organizations would see to it that the Legislature at the next session would enact a bill to be presented to the Legislature at the next session.

The East Side is especially desirous of this equipment, according to Mr. Brannick, who states that since the vetoing of the East Side fire limits ordinance by Mayor Lane, insurance rates have advanced 25 per cent on account of the large number of frame structures being erected in the business district on the other side of the river.

Cows May Not Run at Large.

Sixty days' notice, which is required by law, will be published by County Clerk Fields against cows running at large in Woodstock and Lewis precincts. The electors in these two precincts at the recent

election voted against free cows, and in future the bovines must be tied with a rope to a stake, or be liable to arrest, and the owner fined, if the owner neglects to pay the fine, the cow can be sold by the Constable of the precinct, and may be slaughtered by the purchaser to obtain funds to meet the demands of the court. This course of procedure differs vastly with events of pioneer days, when cows ran all over Portland, and these conspicuous figures in the capital grounds at Salem, and their favorite haunts were frequent subjects of discussion at the time of Legislative sessions, by members from the cow counties.

MAY CLOSE ON SUNDAYS

Effort to Be Made to Shut Up Gresham Saloons.

GRESHAM, Or., June 12.—(Special.)—Eastern Multnomah is still "wet" from the Portland city limits at Montavilla as far as the county line extends eastward. Some of the precincts had a few spasms before election, when an effort was made to force them to go "dry," but for some reason unknown the issue was not forced by the Prohibitionists even after the petitions were signed to put the local option question on the ballots. Now that the liquor element is breathing freely again for two years, another nightmare has arisen to confront the saloons of Gresham. The Common Council has under consideration a petition to close the saloons on Sundays. There are three saloons in Gresham over which the Council has jurisdiction, but there is a loud cry going up that something more than morality is behind the movement. Fred T. Merrill is just now an element in this section and has just opened his new roadhouse on the base line. Those who know his resourceful methods are not slow to assert that he is behind the effort to close the Gresham saloons on Sundays for his own profit. The City Council has this matter under advisement, but an ordinance has been prepared and will be acted upon at the next Council meeting.

WILL BUILD ELECTRIC MILL

W. E. Spicer Will Establish Plant on Powell Valley Road.

W. E. Spicer, who formerly owned and operated the chop mills on East Washington and First streets, has purchased a tract 200x100 at the intersection of Powell Valley road and the Mount Scott electric railway, and will proceed with the erection of a large chop and feed mill. It will be operated by electric power. The mill will be four-story and will cover a

lot 100x75, and the remainder of the ground will be reserved for warehouse purposes.

Mr. Spicer has men clearing the ground for his plant. He will handle about a carload of grain a day at the start, and expects to get it by way of Fairview and the Cedarville branch of the O. W. P. Railway Company. It will be the first industry of any sort to be established in that section.
