MAJOR SEARS' ORDER.—Major Alfred J. Sears, father of Judge Sears, who spent many years in Peru as state engineer, has just signed and sent an order as commander of Lincoln Post, G. A. R., of Lima, Peru, for a reception that will be given shortly to Hon. Elihu Root by the post. This order includes the appointment of committees and the manner in which this reception is to take place. The remarkable character of the document is that it should have been sent to Portland for so many thousands of miles to receive the signature of the commander, Lincoln Post, G. A. R., but all Americans there are associate members, but of course not voting members. Major Sears retains an active interest in Peru and all its interests, and although many thousands of miles away, he is the commander of the G. A. R. post there. He keeps in close touch with everything that goes on in Peru and the surrounding countries, his "den," as he calls it, being a depository of maps and reference books of that portion of South America for which he has done so much.

MAY BUILD NEW CHURCH.—The Westminster Presbyterian Church, East Tenth and Welder streets, has decided not to build an addition to the present church structure. After plans had been drawn up it was found that the cost would be about \$10,000. This was considered a large sum of money to put into an old building and it would still be an old structure. It was decided to defer action and take up the matter of erecting a entirely new church this fall, perhaps on a new location. If the new structure is erected it will be one of the largest and finest church structures on the East Side. The present building is too small and the new structure is needed in that growing section of the city.

BOYS RENDER A CANTATA

BLANCHET INSTITUTE STUDENTS GIVE PERFORMANCE.

"The Bell of Rothstock" in Two Acts Presented at the Empire Theater.

There have been numerous school entertainments given in Portland this Spring, but it is generally conceded that Blanchet Institute stands at the head of the list after the performance of its various classes at the Empire Theater last night. "The Bell of Rothstock," a dramatic cantata of two acts, was the feature of the programme, and the excellent performance of the young boys who took part in it is deserving of unstinted praise. Marked talent was displayed by more than one of the characters, and there were many specially good voices. The chorus work was fine and the solos were unusually well rendered. There was more vocal talent than the famous Pollard troupe on board of, and the public will doubtless hear more of the principals in the cantata.

The Brothers who conduct Blanchet Institute, at Fifth and Mill streets, drilled their young charges for this performance without outside assistance, the music being under the personal direction of Brother Henry and the dramatic work of Brother George. IMPLEMENT FACTORY NEXT
