

SPEAKER CANNON CRACKS HIS WHIP

Congress Must Finish Its
Work, He Says, Before
It Can Adjourn.

THREE BILLS ARE HELD UP

Friday Will Be the Last Day, Say
Members. If Conference Make
Up Their Minds to Ac-
cept the Situation.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Congress will stay in session until its work is finished. This is the dictum of Speaker Cannon and his lieutenants, and is being emphasized at this time to counteract any impression that the pure-food bill, at least, might go over until the next session.

There is also trouble on the meat-inspection bill, and the "tie-up" on the railroad rate bill indicates delay. The immigration bill is also in conference, as are several of the appropriation bills. All of these things must be worked out without any date of adjournment being set, according to the decision of the House leaders. When the work is done an adjournment resolution will be forthcoming in short order.

While the situation today spells delay until next week, the work on the floor is progressing. Members say there is no need of prolonging the session beyond Friday, if the conference make up their minds that the work must be done or that agreements which will meet all demands can be arranged on the conference before that time, and that if the idea of prolonging the session for the purpose of killing certain bills is abandoned, this week will see the end.

DISAGREE ON MEAT INSPECTION

Conferees Discuss Payment of In-
spectors and Labeling of Cans.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The meat-inspection amendment to the agricultural bill probably will be returned to conference, the conferees twice had it under discussion today, and the indications are that the differences in regard to the payment for inspection by the packers or by the Government, or whether the date of inspection must be placed on cans of meat, are irreconcilable. Another effort to get together will be made at 10 o'clock tomorrow. A complete agreement was reached on all other matters in the bill.

Practically all of the important amendments concerning the usual features of the agricultural bill were accepted by the House conferees. These amendments include appropriations of \$10,000 for the establishment of points of export of laboratories to examine and report upon the nature, quality and condition of seed or grain, to serve as a basis for the fixing of definite grades; and \$5000 for the investigation of the insect known as the "corn fly," which affects orange-groves.

Amendments were retained providing that 10 per cent of all money received from each forest reserve each year shall be paid to the States in which the reserves are situated, to be expended for the benefit of the public schools and roads; also the amendment for an investigation of the effect of cold-storage upon the healthfulness of foods. An amendment eliminating that which provided for a conference on the immigration bill.

BACK AGAIN TO CONFERENCE

Two or Three Speeches Made on
Railroad Rate Bill.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—After two or three more speeches on the conference report on the railroad rate bill, the Senate today sent the bill back to conference, again designating Senators Tillman, Eklund and Cullum as conferees.

During the day the new appropriation bill, which has been in conference for several weeks, was finally passed, the Senate receding from its amendment concerning the naval training station at Port Royal, S. C., which was the only item remaining in controversy. The most interesting incident was a conflict over a motion by Senator La Follette to enter upon the consideration of the bill limiting to 16 years the time railroad employees engaged in the movement of trains may be employed consecutively.

There was great difficulty in securing a voting quorum, but the requisite number ultimately was obtained. Several speeches were made on the bill. The Senate adjourned at 4:35 until 11 o'clock tomorrow.

DISCUSSION OF PIPE LINES.

West Virginia Owners Cannot Be In-
cluded in Common-Carrier Class.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—When the conference report on the railroad rate bill was taken up in the Senate today, Senator Eklund, who was one of the Senate conferees, spoke on the amendment to the commodity provision of the bill, which "railroads" instead of the phrase "common carriers." He gave immediate attention to the question of the change in the effect of eliminating pipe lines from the requirement of the bill. He said that West Virginia is the largest oil-producer in the Union, and that the greater part of the oil is sold to the pipe line owners, so that the owners transport their own oil, and are not strictly speaking common carriers.

Senator Long spoke at some length on the pipe line amendment, and in doing so dealt with Kansas oil legislation. That state had declared pipe lines common carriers, as a means of hitting the Standard Oil Company, but it had not had that effect. There had been no effort in Kansas to prohibit the pipe lines from transporting their own products, because it was known that the effect would be disastrous to the independent producers.

The Senate later decided by an almost unanimous vote not to accept the conference report, and to insist further upon its amendment, Senators Tillman, Eklund and Cullum being reappointed conferees.

The House acceded to the request of the Senate for another conference on the railroad rate bill immediately upon the receipt of the Senate's today decision. Messrs. Hepburn, Sherman and Richardson were appointed conferees.

Will Not Go to Panama.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—By a vote of six to four, the Senate committee on Intercommerce today decided not to go to the Isthmus of Panama and take testimony in the canal investigation. By agreement no testimony will be taken in Washington until next session, and therefore the disposition of William Nelson Cromwell's refusal to testify concerning canal matters

prior to Government ownership of the property will be postponed until next December. The action of the committee carries with it an adjournment until next December, which will postpone action on the nominations of Canal Commissioners. It is expected the Commissioners will be reappointed during the recess of Congress.

Nominations Sent to Senate.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The President today sent to the Senate the following nominations: Marshal, District of Idaho, Ruel Rounds; Chief of Bureau of Insular Affairs, Colonel Clarence O. Edwards; to be placed on the retired list, Colonel John Pittman, Ordnance Department, with rank of Brigadier.

Time Fixed for Stock in Transit.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The House today passed the Senate bill which repeals the so-called 24-hour law by fixing the maximum of time in transit for stock at 36 hours, upon the written request of the owner or party in charge of the particular shipment.

Mexican Treaty Ratified.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The Senate in executive session today ratified the treaty with Mexico concerning the division of the waters of the Rio Grande for irrigation purposes.

Idaho Postmaster Confirmed.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The Senate today confirmed the following nominations: Postmaster—Idaho—Francis M. Winters, Montpelier.

President Signs Postoffice Bill.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The President today signed the postoffice appropriation bill.

TARIFF DEBATE IN HOUSE.

Lloyd Concludes With Reference to
Campaign Contributions.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—Although a strong effort was made today to put off general debate on the general deficiency bill, the last of the great supply bills, after Littauer had briefly explained its provisions, Lloyd of Missouri was allowed an hour to discuss the tariff. He concluded with a reference to campaign contributions in 1896 to the Republican party from the insurance companies.

"With a Cabinet officer at the head of the Republican National Committee receiving this fund and distributing it," he said, "is it any wonder the President has ceased talking of publicity of campaign receipts?"

General debate having been concluded, the bill was read under the five-minute rule. Webb of North Carolina made a point of order against the bill, claiming \$20,000 in full settlement of the German claims for losses incurred in connection with the disturbance in Samoa in 1899. The point of order was overruled and the bill remained in the bill.

The rent of the old Custom-House in New York again showed itself in the general deficiency bill in a provision for the current year. Sulzer of New York made a point of order against the item, which was overruled. Sulzer asked how much the Republicans expected to get out of the amount for the forthcoming campaign.

"Not as much as you people will get out of it," replied Tammey.

A provision was inserted in the bill directing the officials of the Territory of Oklahoma to continue the maintenance of all public institutions and execute all existing contracts until the new state government should have been established.

Hull of Iowa offered an amendment appropriating \$10,000 to reimburse officers and enlisted men of the Army who were killed in the Spanish-American war, and who suffered losses of clothing and other personal effects. Littauer made a point of order against the amendment. The chair sustained the point. The general deficiency bill was laid aside, and the House at 6 o'clock took a recess for two hours.

Buy Shipyard Site.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 26.—(Special.)—The E. L. Wood Lumber Company today purchased the shipyard site of the George H. Hitchings Company, which borders on the Wood company's land. The consideration was \$10,000. This site comprises two blocks of land and 500 feet of water front. The Wood company now owns a mile of the best front in the city along the north bank of the Hoquiam River.

Miraculous Escape From Death.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 26.—(Special.)—Sam Miller, an employee of the Northwest Lumber Company, narrowly escaped death today by being caught in the shafting of the mill. He escaped by a hair's breadth, and his clothing and shoes were torn from his body. He was sitting on a flooring machine when he was caught. Though badly bruised and having his leg twisted, he was not seriously injured.

Livestock-Shipments Bill Passes.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, June 26.—Senator Heyburn's bill authorizing the Secretary of Agriculture, in his discretion, to permit the shipment of livestock for a period up to 36 consecutive hours without stop, today passed the House and will become a law before adjournment.

Summer Hotel at Pacific Beach.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 26.—(Special.)—J. O. Stearns, H. Campbell and E. Craig, well-known business men of this city, who own the Pacific Beach townsite, have given out that they will erect a hotel at this Summer resort this season. The work will be commenced at once.

Chehalis County Jury Commission.

HOQUIAM, Wash., June 26.—(Special.)—Attorney L. H. Brewer, of this city, has been appointed to serve on the Chehalis County Jury Commission for the ensuing year. Lewis B. Bignold, of Montesano, is the other appointee.

DEAD NEGROES ON TRACK

Engine Tears Pile of Bodies to
Fragments.

MUSKOGEE, I. T., June 26.—Mistaken for an ash heap by the engineer, three unknown negroes were run over by a Missouri, Kansas & Texas southbound train today at Welch, near the Kansas line. Fragments of the bodies were gathered by the trainmen and found to be cold, which showed they were dead before run over.

A revolver was found near where they lay. The bodies were so badly cut up that the manner in which they met death cannot be ascertained.

Registration Reaches 10,694.

BUTTE, Mont., June 26.—Secretary of the Interior Hitchcock has requested Mayor Martin Maginnis to act as a special commissioner in connection with the drawing at the Crow reservation, which will begin at Billings, July 2. Mayor Maginnis will act. The registration at Billings today was 1381. The entire number thus far is 10,694.
